BEST KEPT VILLAGE



A cheque for £45 was also presented by the Wiltshire Gazette and Herald. All the children who took part in the poster competition received prizes.

It was a lovely warm, sunny afternoon, happily rounded off by everyone enjoying wine and cheese in the Village Hall.



Having spent my early years living very close to the river Medway in Kent and then in a more suburban area of Hertfordshire and, before coming to Great Hinton, the village of Emberton in North Buckinghamshire, I have greatly missed seeing the abundance of bird life which exists in all of those areas.

It is quite wonderful to see flocks of geese, ducks, swans and even the flocks of common gulls in the evening sky, which stopped overnight on the rivers and lakes and in winter all through the day as well. These, in addition to the smaller garden birds, which, strange as it may seem, are in noticeably greater numbers in suburban areas and town parks. However, the village has its share of birds and wild life in general; house sparrows and the starlings aplenty and, as in the town, you can hear the starlings mimic the trill note of the modern telephone.

In addition to these birds there are, of course, many others and this is a very good time of year to see them as they come in closer to the houses and farms for food and shelter during the winter. Already the blue tits are beginning to feed at the nut baskets and it's much easier to see the woodpeckers when they privilege us with a visit to the nearby trees and is a good time of year to see the Storm Cock.

With so many barns being demolished and converted and many of the larger trees gone, it's nice to know we have some tawney or small owls in the village; lovely to watch them silently fly in the dusk of the evening. Should you have a fish pond in the garden beware of 'Frank' the Heron! They spot the fish from very high up when they fly over. Herons are a territorial bird - if you want to keep they away from the gold fish introduce an authentic plastic heron to the pond side. Frank won't trouble you any more!

The traffic claimed the lives of two young foxes in our area a couple of months ago. I'm boundto say Good Luck to any others on 5th December that might live and add interest to our local country scene.

THE VICAR OF GREAT HINTON

Yes, Great Hinton has a Vicar even though it hasn't a Church. From time immemorial Great Hinton, as regards Church life, has been linked with Steeple Ashton and still is - it is part of the ecclesiastical parish of Steeple Ashton (and I regret the name 'Great Hinton' doesn't appear in its official title!). So far as anyone knows, there has never been a Church of England church at Great Hinton (though there was until relatively recently aMethodist Chapel). Steeple Ashton church, like its Vicar, has always been shared by Great Hinton - so much so that the North Porch of the Church (still there though now walled in for security reasons) is, or was, known as the 'Hinton Porch', and a well-designated and probably well-worn footpath led across the fields to join Hinton Lane and then the village itself.

St Mary's, Steeple Ashton, is still your parish Church and I, of course, very much regard Great Hinton as part of my Parish. Nowadays, those linked to Church life come either to Steeple Ashton or to Keevil - it doesn't matter which you choose, and nowadays they are both part of the same group of Parishes (Semington being the other one in my charge).

All four villages are very distinct communities and, as I've said in the Church Newsletter this month, it's good to see Great Hinton blossoming as a community in its own right, achieving much, including this "Grapevine" news-sheet, and I'm grateful to Mr.Truman for the opportunity of writing this paragraph in it. I wish it well and congratulate Great Hinton on producing it. Perhaps you'll be building your own Church next!

CITY TO VILLAGE

Malcolm and Madeline Welsh from Wallington, which is in the London Borough of Sutton, near Croydon, moved to Great Hinton with their two boys this time last year after twelve years in the London area. He and his family moved to be nearer the centre of his work in publishing in Southern England and Wales. I asked Malcolm to put on paper some of their reactions to living in a village in contrast to city life and he had these thoughts to reflect.....

It took us some time to get used to the friendliness of the local people who would stop and chat as though they had known us for years. In London this friendliness would be treated with suspicion as though there was some kind of catch. Very rarely would people speak, especially on the trains where newspapers were held high as a shield against the

evil risk of communication.

We are now getting used to and enjoying the deafening quiet of the country life in contrast to the deafening noise of city life, and enjoy hearing the Post Office van

getting near and nearer to our house each morning!

The fresh air in Great Hinton, compared with diesle and petrol fumes of the Big City, is a delight shared by many of our visiting friends from the city who are always eager to

arrange another visit soon!

Madeline and I were always very nervous to let our two sons, who quite naturally are travel alone to local parks or to the nearest football field because of football mad, all the criminal activities we hear about and I would answer their heavy traffic and protests by saying 'Never mind, we shall soon be in the freedom of the countryside where you can play football to your hearts content". How wrong I was! I still have to drive them to Trowbridge or Devizes to kick a ball around in the town parks. I do hope that the suggestion made at the last Parish Council meeting that consideration should be given to buying or renting a local field will be pursued as, with morechildren in the village, I am sure it will be a worthwhile village amenity.

After nearly twelve months Madeline and I have learned to "stock up" with provisions as we are no longer able to stroll around the corner for a packet of tea as I found out one morning when I came down to make a cup of tea, I had to get dressed and motor to the nearest town for provisions and eventually get my well earned up of tea! I still wouldn't change the peace and tranquility of the village with the convenience of shops. I sometimes return to Croydon on business and one one occasion when I was with Madeline back on our familiar territory, dodging heavy traffic and milling with the crowds, all of whom seemed to share the same expression of gloom, I turned to Madeline and said "This is all so familiar, it's almost as if Great Hinton had never been", and it seemed very strange to point the car towards to M4 and Wiltshire instead of our usual stop-start

conjested short journey to our previous home. We are convinced that our move to Great Hinton and the country was the right one even though we still have more adjusting to do, we intend to remain here as long as the

foreseeable future allows.
