

As most of you will know Audrey Plummer is on a three month visit with her sister and brotherin-law to relatives in Australia and New Zealand and she has kindly sent us some thoughts of her trip to date, commencing in Brisbane in late July.

"I'm writing this before leaving Australia for New Zealand. We've indeed had a hectic ten days between Queensland and New South Wales. To date we've met 52 of our relations and that's not all by a long My cousin Gordon and his wife Carol with whome we are at present staying live in a superb low sit brick house (a bungalow to you and me!) It is situated in $2\frac{1}{2}$ acres of scrub (wood land) consisting of various kinds of gum trees with a few pines. There are also wattle trees in abundance (accacias) some of which are in full bloom. Koalas are to be found

We did find a possum last night so feel somewhat rewarded! There are also wallabies around in the woodland, we saw one on our way home one evening.

Down in New South Wales another of my numerous cousins took us to see kangaroos grazing and they obligingly hopped around for us! We've also visited a wild life sanctuary which housed only animals and birds indiginous to Australia so we roamed amongst kangaroos, wallabies, koalas, wombats and procupines plus dingoes, parrot, cockatoos etc.

Here at Gordon's we are awakened by a dawn chorus of a different sort, the kookaburas do indeed sit in the old gum tree and 'laugh'! There is one bird in particular which intrigues us as he literally sings down the scale, we haven't been able to locate him but love listening to his song. The Billy wagtails are larger than our pied wagtails and wag from side to side, rather than up and down. Magpies are in abundance but are different from our magpies. There is also a yellow robin. Motoring through the border ranges between Queensland and New South Wales we stopped in the rain forest to listen to the bell bird, which really does sound like a bell.

My impression of all the houses we have been in, however small, is one of spaciouness as in each one the living area is completely open plan from kitchen to family room to hall to sitting room to games room, and most houses seem to have a games room.

The weather so far has been beautiful but however hot it is during the day the temperature drops rapdily at night. The sun sets very quickly giving hardly any twilight, it's almost as though someone has switched off a light. The hospitality has been fantastic and everyone seems pleased to see these English cousins - some after 32 years, some for the first time!

We visited Expo '88 managing to see a few pavilions as there were long queues at every one of them, it was all most impressive on a site beside the Brisbane river.

9th August: A hasty note from New Zealand! This is a fantastic country and we've been through such varying landscapes from native bush to open plains. The bush seems like some primaeval forest, there are giant firs and tall trees such as new never see at home, then suddenly there is a roar of rushing water and you come to a rocky clearing with a spectacular waterfall. It's all so overwhelming. We've been to Rotarua to see the geysers and mud-pools - quite unbelievable. One Sunday evening we went to a 'Hangi', a traditional Maori meal followed by Maori dancing and singing, very enjoyable! /continued.....

Some later news from Audrey is quoted from a letter to Sandy dated 20th August which brings her trip up to date for us.

"I left Chris and John's for my tour of the South Island of New Zealand last Monday and travelled down to Gisborne for a brief stopover - it was sunny and warm. The Landlord of the Guest House took me on a conducted tour of places of interest. Captain Cook first landed here but was not greeted very warmly by the natives so he named it the Bay of Poverty and sailed round to Tauranga where he received a more friendly welcome so he named that the Bay of Plenty!

From Gisborne I went on to Napier by bus and from there to Wellington by train and after an overnight stop travelled by ferry across Cook Straits to Picton and from there by train to Christchurch. Another overnight stop and I was on my way to Queenstown for two nights, taking in a day trip to Milford Sound by coach, out through the sound and into the Tasman sea by launch, returning by light aircraft over Fiordland back to Queenstown, Am now back in Christchurch for two nights then back to Wellington before returning to Rotorua by plane on Wednesday. It's a real American style tour but had to be done that way to get everything in. After two full days back at Chris and John's I leave for the last bit of my stay in Australasia, in Perth".

I'd like to thank Audrey for these interesting travel notes and to say how much we are all looking forward to hearing about the rest of her trip when she returns home in October. COOKERY CORNER:

Now that Runner Beans are plentiful here's a receipe for a really delicious chutney - it was given to me by Brenda Hobbs of Stoggy Lane and comes from a old Canadian W.I. Recipe Book. You need:

21bs Runner beans, chopped $\frac{1}{2}$ " pieces (can be made from frozen beans).

 $1\frac{1}{2}$ lbs onion - chopped. 1 heaped tablespoon cornflour.

1 tablespoon Tumeric. 1 heaped tablespoon dry mustard.

1 lb Demerara Sugar. 1 lb soft Brown sugar.

1½ pints vinegar.


Prepare Beans and onions. Cook Beans in well salted water until tender. Cook chopped onions in $\frac{1}{2}$ pint vinegar.

Strain beans, add rest of vinegar and cook ten minutes, with onions and dry ingredients mixed to a smooth paste with vinegar.

Add sugars together with rest of ingredients and boil for 15 minutes or more.

Bottle and cover - keep very well. Anne Truma

TREE PLANTING PROJECT


