
VILLAGE SKITTLES EVENING

Cookery Corner

Have you a favourite recipe for the Grapevine Readers so that we can make this a regular feature?

Also, any household hints or gardening tips? If so, please let me have them before the next issue of the magazine. Meanwhile I will pass on a couple of my favourite recipes given to me by friends. Both can be made in advance.

CHICKEN BAKE

(Can also be made with pre cooked Chicken)

2 Tablespoons Oil

4 Boneless, skinless Chicken Breasts (cut into bite size pieces) Large Onion, finely chopped

1 x 10 1/2 oz Can Condensed Chicken or Mushroom Soup

4 Tablespoons Chicken Stock

3 Tablespoons Double or Single cream

2oz. Grated Cheese - approx.

Large Packet Cheese & Onion or Plain Crisps (lightly crushed)
Pre-cooked - Leeks, Broccoli, Carrots, Celery, Frozen Peas or Corn (use all or any combination. It is recommended <u>not</u> to use Courgettes)
Salt, Pepper & Parsley

Stir fry Chicken (if using uncooked) for about 5 minutes. Move to a large mixing bowl with slotted spoon. Cook onion, add to the chicken with the soup, stock, cream, parsley and stir well. Then add chosen vegetables and blend it gently. Transfer to a large shallow oven proof dish. Season. (Note: can be frozen at this stage). Mix cheese & crisps together and cover chicken mixture. Cook at 190 C (375 F, Gas Mark 5) for approximately 35-45 minutes until bubbling and brown on top. Exact amounts are not important for this dish.

RASPBERRY PUDDING

Frozen or fresh Raspberries Castor sugar to sweeten 1/2 pt. Plain yoghurt 1/2 pt.Double Cream - Whipped Demerara Sugar

Put Raspberries in dish (still frozen). Add Sugar. Add Yoghurt to Whipped cream and cover raspberries. Sprinkle generously with demerera sugar and leave in a fridge overnight.

The annual open Parish Council meeting which was held on the 24th March, was well attended and included our local County & District councillors, namely Gareth Roberts and Adrian Fox and P.C. Mark Newberry, our local community policeman. The Chairman gave a report on the main Parish Issues which had arisen over the past year, which included;

<u>Semington Crematorium</u> - building is now imminent and assurances have been received that the very stringent planning conditions would be strictly adhered to and hopefully there would be minimal adverse effects on the environment and nearby inhabitants.

Road Safety - there had been a good response from the residents to the removal of hazards which were restricting the already narrow village roads, e.g. overgrown trees, hedges, etc. The growing season will soon be here and it is necessary to maintain this improvement. *Note*. Village residents should watch their vehicle speeds and a 15mph maximum speed is recommended.

Recycling Bins - already reported elsewhere.

The Chairman concluded his report by thanking the many parishioners involved in organising the various village activities.

Finance - reported the Parish Council precept would be as for the previous year.

Results of the Wiltshire Constabulary Survey - PC Newberry introduced a video presentation which provided the results and changes now taken by the police following their customer satisfaction survey. It was satisfying to know though, most people thought the police gave a reasonable service, changes have been made in line with the public constructive comments received.

Neighbourhood Watch Update - PC Newberry spoke of the value of neighbourhood watch in helping the police and reported that the police were intending to provide more support. A good debate was held, emphasising the trauma experienced by victims burgled and the need to make burglary a high policing priority. Gareth Roberts reported a further £6million had been made available in the County to provide some 60 additional police who are to be assigned to community policing. The other major point made, was the need for everyone to liase with the Watch co-ordinator, e.g. Sandy Salmon when you are going on holiday.

<u>W.W.D.C Plan</u> - Adrian Fox gave a brief outline of the plan which includes a policy to maintain the heritage and character of small villages by strictly limiting any further development. This policy includes Great Hinton.

DESERT CORNER



Joan Barker has provided a recipe for EASY PEASY RICE PUDDING.

2.5 oz. rice
1.5 to 2 pints milk
1 oz. butter
2 tbsp. sugar
some single cream

Start with a buttered 2 pint piedish, rice, sugar (and a vanilla pod or cinnamon stick for a change). Add 1 pint milk brought to boil, and put into a gentle oven for 1 hour at 275 F, 140 C or Gas Mark 1. Then stir the pudding and add half to 1 pint more milk. After 2 hours stir up again and then add some single cream, and a little butter at the end - 2.4 to 3 hours.

Some prefer nutmeg to a vanilla pod or cinnamon stick - why not try them all! Easy!
