Everyone will remember the sunny day that favoured the village on Father's day when the ninth Agony Run was held, which raised £1,757 and enabled a donation of £1,112 to be made to the Special Care Baby Unit at the Royal United Hospital.

The race was well supported by the local running clubs, with 137 people competing on the day. Chris Tweedie won in a time of 14 min 21 sec, followed by Gerry Fice (14.32). Judy Farr (18.51) was followed home by Jackie Rockliffe (19.32). An ever improving Russell Crumpler won the village cup and in doing so reduced the village record to 16min.21 sec. In his age group he was beaten by a school friend, Robin Karn (15.10), which was a record time for the 13-16 year old boys. A close battle between Oliver Smith and Mark Hallam resulted in Oliver (20.03) beating Mark (20.04). Both times were better than last year. Xanthe Smith improved on her last year's time by over 6 minutes and took the village ladies (girls) prize. Pat Putt (27.53) was second in the village ladies class followed by Alex Winterburn (31.40) in third.

Our major sponsors, The Linnet, Lloyds Bank, Vanguard Windows and Superior Creative Services considerably reduced the financial burden associated with running the event, plus mention must go to all the others who donated time and prizes. THANK YOU ALL. The main contributing activities were the Raffle (£609), Bottle Stall (£348), Entry Fees (£263) and the BBQ (£147).

COOKERY CORNER

PORK TENDERLOIN WITH CREAM AND CHEESE (Serves 4)

1 1/2 lb. (700g) Tenderloin of Pork cut into inch thick medallions

2 medium onions, finely chopped 2oz (100g) grated Parmesan cheese

1/2 pint Double Cream

a little butter, salt & pepper



Preheat the oven to 400F/200C/Gas 6. Lightly butter a deep 3 pint oven proof dish, and arrange layers of meat (well seasoned with salt & pepper), onions and Parmesan. You should get two layers: Meat, onion, cheese, meat, onion and cheese. Bake in the oven for 50 minutes and then add the double cream and bake for a further 15 minutes until golden brown. Serve with noodles or new potatoes and Green salad.

Ingredients:

3lb. chicken - cooked

Juice of large lime

1/2 pint Mayonnaise (Helmans)

1/2 pint Fromage Frais

2-3 Tablespoons Ginger & Mango Chutney (or Mango Chutney with grated fresh ginger)

Finely chopped garlic clove

Zest of lime and a large Mango

Break the cooked chicken into bite size pieces. Squeeze on juice of large lime. Set aside - covered in a fridge if making in advance. Combine Mayonnaise, Fromage Frais, Chutney, Garlic and zest of lime. Cover and leave in fridge until about an hour before serving. add to chicken with chopped fresh Mango. Serve with rice salad.

PARISH PATHS FOR PLEASURE - THE FIRST IN AN OCCASIONAL SERIES OF ONE

The civil parish of Great Hinton is crossed by a web of footpaths. Most will have come into existence to provide the shortest route for people to travel between two places. Not only has the original purpose of many paths been lost with the passage of time but a number of routes shown on the 1985 Ordnance Survey have now also disappeared.

The development of the motor car has meant, for most people, that we no longer need our parish footpaths for essential travel. However they can provide much enjoyment and an entirely different view of the countryside in which we live. Using the footpaths for leisure also ensures that the public right of way is maintained.

There is a wide variety of walks, both in distance and terrain, to choose from which, for the more vigorous include trips to Seend Cleeve (via Seend Head Mill), to Keevil (returning via an old drove road and the Lamb) and to Steeple Ashton. One of the most interesting and attractive being the direct path to St.Mary's Church at Steeple Ashton.

As a simple introduction to the delights, and occasional hazard, of walking our footpaths I would like to suggest a short walk that stays within the parish boundary.

CIRCULAR WALK FROM THE LINNET

Start from the Linnet and pass behind the pub up Back Lane. After approx. 150 yds you will find a stile on the right alongside a gate. Walk through the field keeping close to the right

hand hedge. In a dip at the bottom is a double stile which takes you through the hedgerow. Stop for a while and enjoy the view, on a clear day you can see for miles.

Keep walking downhill, again close to the right hand hedgerow to the next field. Here is the last resting place of a small number of great elms that used to grace the countryside before Dutch elm disease decimated the great native tree.

The more adventurous may wish to continue travelling Norm, and across the parish boundary, to Brickfield Farm, which seems to have been the site of a small local brickworks. However as this is only a short walk we are going to return southeast, up the hill and diagonally across this steeply sloped field.

One of the arts of fieldwalking is to spot the stile from a distance and walking directly to it, instead of wandering along the whole length of a hedge looking for it. Once found you can walk almost directly across this next field to an opening and through it into, yet another field. The next stile is almost new and very easy to spot below Watts Farm.

From here you cross one of the neatest trimmed fields in the area. Over the stile and turn right. This will take you up hill, with the Manor on your right. At the top you rejoin the road at the edge of the village. During your walk you should have seen many rabbits, a wide variety of birds and depending on the time of the year lots of interesting plants and wild flowers. In all a most enjoyable 15-25 minutes.



CHILDREN'S COOKERY CORNER

(Please ensure that adult supervision is provided)

GINGER BISCUITS

10 oz. plain flour

8 oz. granulated sugar

1 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

2 teaspoons ground ginger

1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder

6 oz. hard margarine

1 tablespoon golden syrup

2 tablespoons milk

Melt together the margarine, syrup and milk in a saucepan or in the microwave. Mix all the dry ingredients in a large bowl. Stir in the melted mixture and knead into a soft dough. Roll

into small balls about the size of a walnut. This will make at least 3 dozen (unless you want to make larger biscuits). Place on a greased baking tray. Leave room for expansion. bake at 150 degrees C for 15 minutes. Place on a wire tray to cool. (Scrumptious - Ed.)
