The youngster who bowled everyone out in the first over deserved his 'man of the match' award. Last place.

Undeterred Min led the enthusiastic Unihoc team into action the next week, and Kevin gambled the Joker on the collective talents of the team. The round robin event was played with a special Unihoc rink imported from Sweden. Oliver Smith managed to score several penalty goals, and Great Hinton won (24 goals) with Edington (16 goals) in second place. Now Great Hinton were second in the overall table.

In the next event, Touch Rugby, mixed teams of male and female, young and old(er), battled all day to score as many tries as possible in a rugby game with a difference - no scrums and forward passing allowed. Well done to Xanthe and Imogen who were dwarfed by some of the opposition. Silver medals and mini rugby balls to the children, then placed Great Hinton in first place overall.

With rumours of County Table Tennis players, plus the rivalry with Keevil, our chances of retaining first place were considered slim. Ernie Wickham, Anthony and Simon played excellently, narrowly losing out to Keevil (360 pts to 354 pts), who won a Table Tennis table from Leekes. Still in first place.

Doris & Derek Saville joined the swimming squad to represent the over 60's and together with a determined performance from all of the team, Great Hinton gained bronze medal position.

The team collected individual gold medals and a host of sports goods at the awards ceremony, plus a cheque for £500 which has been banked with the Village Hall funds.


A Merry Xmas to all readers!

CRANBERRY DREAM DESSERT

Base:

20z. butter 40z. digestive biscuits roughly crushed 1 teasp. ground ginger

Filling:

60z. full fat cream cheese
30z. castor sugar
1 tablsp.powdered gelatine
(dissolved in 4 tablsp. hot water
and allowed to cool slightly)
1/2 pt. double cream lightly whipped
1/2 x 350g jar Cranberry Sauce

Topping: (optional)

1/2 x 350g jar Cranberry Sauce 1/4 pt. double cream whipped

Melt butter in pan, stir in biscuits and ground ginger.

Line base of greased loose-bottomed 7" tin.

Soften cream cheese in large bowl. Stir in sugar & prepared gelatine, fold in cream & cranberry sauce.

Spread mixture on biscuit base & leave in fridge until completely set.

Remove from tin & top with remaining cranberry sauce & decorate with whipped cream.

Can be frozen for up to 2 months.


NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

This will consist of two laps around the village, via Main Street and Back Lane with three nominated changeover points on each lap.


Help wanted:

COOKERY CORNER

Tipsy Cake (an alternative Xmas Pud)

2oz blanched almonds
2oz hazel nuts
3 tbsp brandy
2 tbsp orange liqueur
2 tbsp cherry or almond liqueur
12 trifle sponges or madeira cake
5oz plain chocolate
15fl.oz double cream
1oz Cocoa powder
5oz icing sugar



Spread almonds and hazel nuts out separately on a tray & toast in the oven at 200 degrees for 5 mins. until golden.

Transfer the hazel nuts to a tea towel and rub off the skins whilst warm. Spread all the nuts out to cool for 5 mins then chop roughly.

Line a 2.5 pint pudding basin with damp muslin. In a separate bowl mix together brandy & liqueurs and set aside.

Split the sponges in half. Sprinkle with brandy and line the basin with moistened sponges, reserving enough to cover the top.

Using a sharp knife chop 3oz of the chocolate into small pieces and set aside. In a separate bowl (I hope you have enough) whip cream with 4oz icing sugar until stiff & fold in the chopped chocolate & nuts. Divide the mixture into two and use one half to spread over the sponge lining in an even layer.

Melt the remaining chocolate; cool slightly, then fold into the remaining cream mixture. Fill the centre of the pudding, level to the top and cover with the remaining moistened sponges. Trim edges, cover and refrigerate for at least 12 hours.

To serve. Uncover, invert a flat serving dish over the basin and turn upside down. Carefully remove the muslin. Serve cold, dusted with remaining icing sugar and cocoa powder.

I was sworn to secrecy and on the day of the party the large Christmas tree was completely covered with golliwogs! (It wasn't a banned word in those days!)

Like my grandchildren today, we got excited about Christmas weeks in advance and the lumpy bulging stocking at the foot of the bed was the best bit. If possible it contained that rare treat an orange, plus nuts and always a small piece of coal for good luck! We had homemade toffee and sickly peppermint creams - made by my sisters and collected armfuls of holly and mistletoe from the woods. In the evening of Christmas day we all gathered at Gran's house for a huge cold supper, games and singing. Uncle Harold was a brilliant pianist and we younger children were allowed to stay up late for once!

Lovely happy memories and I hope today's children will look back on their more commercial Christmas with as much pleasure.

CHILDREN'S COOKERY CORNER

Something special for Christmas
CHOCOLATE CRISPY PUDDINGS (makes 12-15)

(Please make sure an adult helps you to melt the chocolate)

8oz cooking chocolate
2 oz Rice Krispies
2oz sultanas or raisins
1 oz chopped peel or chopped cherries
8 tablespoons of icing sugar
Cherries and angelica to decorate
Cake cases and cling film



Melt the chocolate in a basin over hot water or in the microwave (ADULT HELP HERE). Stir in the Krispies, sultanas chopped cherries. Place 1 heaped tablespoon onto a piece of cling film (approx. 20cm X 20cm). Wrap cling film around and form a ball shape, twisting the cling film at the top. Leave to set. Repeat until mixture is used. remove cling film and place balls smooth side up in the cake cases. Mix the icing sugar with 4-6 teaspoons of water. Put 1 teaspoon of the mix onto each pud. Decorate with a small piece of cherry and angelica to represent holly. Now try and leave them until Christmas



PRODUCED IN GREAT HINTON

"When you next make some honey, I'll have some" I've been asked - but I don't. I only 'market' it for the bees.

So 'hive to bread' this is what happens. The bees collect nectar from trees and plants. This becomes honey when the bees have added their enzymes which cause the higher sugars to invert. There is 38% of fructose, 31% glucose and 17% water in the average honey.

The honey, surplus to their requirements, is stored in the 'supers' (see diagram). The drawn out wax cells are filled. When the honey has no more than 17% water, and only then will the bees cap or wax over the open ends to seal the honey. The number of supers depends on how much the bees are gathering. When the beekeeper thinks the time is ready to gather the honey, the supers are removed to the bee proof room.



Here the frames are removed and uncapped (the wax sliced off with a long bladed knife). Then they are put in an extractor - an expensive piece of equipment which is a large plastic drum with a metal cage to hold approximately nine frames. The metal cage is spun out to the drum walls and collected at the bottom where there is a tap.

It is then strained into another tapped container and left to settle. Later it is bottled into jars.

The colour, taste and texture depends on what the bees have collected. Around here there are the yellow old seed rape fields. This produces a very pale honey which granulates very quickly - even in the hive. Hopefully the beekeeper manages to extract and bottle it before this happens. In the jars it can be warmed back into a spreadable and usable state.




