

THE FIRST GREAT HINTON WHEELBARROW RACE BOXING DAY 1993

COOKERY CORNER



<u>Carrot Ginger Soup</u> (Ingredients for 6 servings)

1 1/2 lb. carrots - peeled & sliced
1 1/2 pt. Chicken Stock
1 piece Root ginger - peeled
2 oz. Butter
2 large onions, peeled & sliced
1 1/2 teaspoons ground ginger tom
1 1/2 teaspoons grated Orange rind
2 tablespoons Orange Juice
Salt - Black Pepper
Garnish with whipping cream & parsley sprigs

Place carrots, stock & ginger in pan. Bring to boil and then simmer for 20 minutes. Discard ginger. Melt butter in a saucepan, add onions & fry for 3 minutes. Stir in ground ginger. Cook for 1 minute. Stir in orange rind & juice; add carrots and stock. Cover & bring to boil, then simmer for 10 minutes. Puree soup in a blender or processor. Return to pan, season to taste. Reheat and swirl individual helpings with whipping cream and parsley sprigs. Can be made in advance and reheated later. Serve with herb rolls or melba toast.

CLAIRE MITCHELL AND THE 'GOLD' PROJECT

You may have read in the Wiltshire Times or already know that *Claire Mitchell* of Great Hinton has been selected to take part in the Guiding Overseas Linked with Development project. Claire will be teaching English to a group of Guides in Slovakia. She needs to raise £600 and has already been very active in organising a raffle with a balloon flight as a first prize. A quiz night is planned at the Linnet.

The Hall Committee considered her project at a recent meeting and approved a £50 donation from funds towards her trip.

ANOTHER LOCAL WALK

This is a five mile route but transport can be left at the halfway point where refreshments can be obtained during pub opening hours. The route can be varied to accommodate runners, walkers, bikers or even families with prams (for the latter stick to the roads).

Leave the village towards the Lamb and just after the Manor House, turn left over the stile and head diagonally across the field (015 degrees) into the next field and continue on the heading to the far corner of this field which comes out next to the Putts house. Follow the green lane towards Hiscocks and the main road. Turn right and either cross the road and follow the indicated footpath towards the canal or walk towards the Lamb and take a left hand turn down a tarmac lane. Both ways will lead you to a bungalow after which you turn right over a bridge and past a pond on your right. Walk along the drive to the front of the farmhouse whose outbuildings are covered in old signs, ensuring that you shut the two gates that you must go through to reach the swing bridge over the canal. (Road users can go out of the village towards the Lamb turning left at the main road and then right.)

Once across the canal turn right towards Seend. The footpath has been renewed in 1993 and allows easy use by pushchairs etc. Besides any boating activity watch out for wildlife, especially herons, which I have seen on several occasions. Follow the footpath to the road bridge by the 'Barge' inn.

Having been suitably refreshed the way back is largely on roads affording fine views from Seend Head. Turn right after the canal footpath or out of the 'Barge' and continue up the hill past the 'Brewery'. After reaching the top continue for 200 yd and then turn right, shortly after the road descends. This road leads you along the top of Seend Head.

After going down the steep descent proceed through the farmyard by the Mill crossing the river and then going up a small rise along a grass track towards the main road. Turn right and carefully proceed in single file along the main road towards the 'Lamb'. Thirsty again?

I am sure that you can all find your way back from here.
