On October 8th we held a 25th Anniversary Lunch for past and present members; a good time of reunions with old friends and delicious food.



#### NO PAIN - NO GAIN

The time is 3.30am with the mist slowly rising off the water; the spotlight picking up the faint and ghostly silhouettes of the bridge parapets in the distant. Beneath my feet the engine works a timeless rhythm as my hand clasped to the tiller bar guides my vessel on through the night. Below in the warm security of the boat muffled voices, mixed with the occasional laugh and clinking of glasses, disturbs my concentration. Begrudgingly I continue on ..... 35.5 hours to go.

Bradford on Avon approaches and darkened houses remind me of my bed .... (DON'T DUCKS SLEEP!!). I turn the boat at the winding-hole with cautious precision, aware my engine may easily annoy ..... but nothing stirs. All about me there is a deathly quiet.

A beaming smile greets me from the darkened hatch access announcing my breakfast is ready. As I enter the galley I am welcomed as 'The All Conquering Hero'. I slide into the armchair with the contentment that I'm doing my bit. The bright lights of the boat take a while to adjust to. As I breath the heady smell of bacon and eggs (The 3rd of five fry ups) a few hot drinks with a bit of whiskey follow. The crew is on a high. Jokes flow, old and new, and all too soon it's my turn to helm again.

Our live broadcast on BBC Wiltshire Sound on Saturday and Sunday brought all and sundry to witness the 'spectacle'. However as day turned to night for the second time our spirits started to wilt as the realisation that we were £350 short of our hopeful target of £1000 became apparent.

Having formed a 'Press Gang' we decided to bend the rules slightly by dropping the 'off' duty crew at Bradford-on-Avon to raid all the pubs and scour the streets for late shoppers. Then realising the motorist was escaping the 'Press Gang' stopped all the traffic by pushing the pedestrian crossing button .... A very successful method.

Midnight, 15 hours to go... the crew are pleased with the evenings efforts but £75 is still yet to be found. We pair up at the helm for safety as I nearly fall overboard asleep on watch at 1.40am. We are all exhausted and find it hard to entertain ourselves. 'Trivial Pursuit' is suggested and it takes 3 hours to finish as our brains fail to comprehend the questions. It's now 5.30am ...... 9.5 hours to go, even with company at the helm conversation gradually decreases.

The girls from the Clinton Cards shop, having worked all day at the shop and returning to the boat to cook and make copious cups of hot fluid for the four helmsmen all night, lose their feminine looks as a haggard look descends upon them .... Such devotion!

The last four hours were the longest of all the trip. Our boredom and lack of sleep are getting the better of us.

A 200 peg fishing match programmed for the river was moved to the canal as high levels of water made fishing impossible .... fishermen (the boaters friends !!) with their £500 carbon fibre rods across the towpath and canal which raise as if in salute as we approach, their stern faces and tight pockets become a real challenge, but we win through in the end!.

3 hours to go ...... our target of £1000 has been passed, YIPPEE!!

On planning our last leg to finish at Bradford-on-Avon it appears (on a recount) that our total has actually reached £1100 and so we decided to finish with a BANG. Horns blasting from members of the crew, who are starting to come to life, give the appearance that we have just escaped from the 'Funny Farm'.

With people are waving and praising us and champagne at the ready, we cross the line to fireworks and corks popping. We all cuddle and embrace ourselves on a job well done.

WE DID IT! 50 hours non stop; 22 return trips from Bradford-on-Avon to Trowbridge (44 kegs) and over 120 miles.

The final figure raised was £1140.33 and I would like to thank all who sponsored me from Great Hinton and Steeple Ashton to help those 'Children in Need'.

Would I do it again..... Yes! But don't ask me to write about it.

#### PARISH PATHS WITH A PURPOSE

In years gone by, before we all had our own cars, going to church required some determination as one of the only ways to go was on foot. The path starts at the stile next to Church Farm in back Street, in all but summer wellingtons are strongly recommended.

Start by making the short climb to the gateway in front of you. From the gate carry on in a straight line to the far corner of the field, where you will find a stile and bridge which takes you through the hedgerow. The arrow on the stile points across the field to a gateway which leads into a small field, where rubble and earth tipping has taken place. Follow the track round the edge of this field to the gate onto the Keevil road.

Having entered the field across the road keep the fence on your right and head to the next, very muddy gateway. In the next field keep close to the left hand hedgerow down the hill to another, even muddier gateway. In the next field you start to climb gently uphill, with the tower of St Mary's, Steeple Ashton straight in front. When you reach the corner of the field there is a newly planted copse, which in decades to come will provide our countryside with a small haven for wildlife.

A choice now confronts you. Straight on for St. Mary's or turn left for St. Lawrence's. I chose left and Keevil.

The next section of the walk is simple; just keep close to the left hand hedgerow as you pass through 3 fields. It was here that I disturbed a variety of small birds, rabbits and a couple of cock pheasants. Looking across to the right there is an excellent view across Keevil airfield. The path now narrows as it passes between the hedge on the left and the ruins of an old brick built agricultural building. Nearly at the church.

In this next field you will soon find a stile on the left taking you into one final field alongside the church graveyard. A short walk across the middle of the field to a recently re-built stile. A wooden bridge takes you across the drainage ditch, one last stile and you have arrived at the church.

If like me, you take this walk at the end of the week you will almost certainly be in no fit state of dress to enter the church but you will have considerable sympathy for those villagers of years gone by who made this, or the journey to St Mary's every Sunday morning.

If you have had enough of field walking you can return to the village by road or, as I did you can take the footpath alongside Keevil Manor (starting at the end of the wall on the Keevil road nearest to Great Hinton) which crosses the fields to the Lamb on the Strand. This a rewarding walk as at the beginning you can enjoy an excellent view of the outstanding Manor House.

The path joins the route of an old, long gone, drove road. Taking this route back makes the whole about 2.5-3 miles by the time you return to Great Hinton. I can think of no better way of enjoying the countryside whilst gaining a little insight into the hardships of country life in the age before the age of the motor car. (this return walk from Keevil will be covered in more detail in a future edition.. Ed)
















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## MESSAGE FROM THE VICARAGE

# A CHRISTMAS RECIPE: TIRAMISU

A quick method to make this light Italian trifle - with a little help from Tesco's!! Nice for Christmas day tea time! (can be made the day before)

## **Ingredients:**



4oz Sponge fingers
5 fluid oz Black Coffee (strong instant will do)
5 Tablespoons Tia Maria (or Avaretto liqueur)
500 gm. carton fresh Tesco (or M&S) Custard
10 oz carton MASCARPONE cheese
10 oz. whipping cream - lightly whipped
1 oz Flaked almonds
1-2 tablespoons cocoa powder OR Milk Flake bar


Arrange sponge fingers in bottom of a deep glass dish. Pour over coffee (cooled) and Tia Maria. Allow to stand for 10 minutes.

In a separate bowl add custard to cheese and beat together until smooth. Spread on top of the sponge fingers and chill for 2 hours.

Lightly whip cream, spread over cheese mixture. Sprinkle on flaked almonds. Dust with cocoa <u>or</u> for a sweeter taste crumble on milk flake instead.

Chill for at least another hour.

(Note: I have not tried freezing this pudding)


