



Agony Run & Fun day raises over £2000

This years agony run and fun day has raised £2081.57. All proceeds are going in to the funds for the new village hall.

In late June the population in Bona Vista in Newfoundland was increased by a factor of six when the replica *Matthew* arrived. Shortly before this event the population of Great Hinton also dramatically increased with the staging of the twelfth AGONY RUN.

Despite a change in the course, all 123 runners made it around the 2.76 mile course with S. Roe completing the course in 14 minutes 47 seconds. Our

first villager home was James L'Esteve, three minutes later, with the very creditable time of 17 minutes 46 seconds and was followed by David Parsons (18:23) and Jonathan Francis (18:54).

Rosemary Barber was the first female to finish in a *record time* of 17 minutes 3 seconds beating the old record set by Barbara Leitch (17:15 in 1987). A further two and a half minutes elapsed before Susie Phillips crossed the line. The first female villager was Rachel Jones (23:35) who narrowly beat Xanthe Smith (24:7) with Lisa Parsons (27:7).

The other record time on the day was Josh Robinson (18:26), aged 9, who beat the previous record for this age group held by James Earney (19:16 in 1991). The Robinson family had four members running on the day.

Parish Council News

The Parish Council held its annual Open Parish Meeting on Wednesday 2nd July. In addition to parishioners, the meeting was attended by Mark Newbery (our community policeman), Doug Firmager (our County Councillor) and the Vicar, David Hart.

Chris Munday, as chairman of the Parish Council, briefly outlined the issues which the Parish Council had tackled on behalf of the village during the preceding year. This included: liaison with the highways department and the water company in relation to the new water main works, the never ending problem of hedge cutting, representation on town planning matters, the success of our campaign for a speed limit and the ongoing drive for a reduction to 20mph.

Following 5 years of success in the best kept village competition, we slipped to 4th place this year.

On the financial front, the council tax precept has been kept to last year's level of £650, even though expenditure is currently running at over £700 per annum.

In response to a parishioners suggestion, we will be writing to both the County Council and the new landowner to try and get the hedge on the North side of the narrows cut back. Individuals may wish to express their own concerns on this issue by writing direct to the Area Highway Engineer at Wiltshire County Council, Western Area Highway Office, Lancaster Road, Bowerhill, Melksham.

Another parishioner queried with Mark Newbery whether the police would be taking any speed limit enforcement measures. Mark undertook to liaise with his traffic section colleagues to investigate the extent of the problem and if necessary to take action.

Recipe

A French-Oriental chicken dish whose reputation is known to some (for 4 people but can be scaled up for bigger occasions!).

Take 750g of chicken meat diced into 2" cubes and marinate in 1 tblsp of Light Soy sauce, 1 tblsp Dark Soy Sauce, 1 tblsp of Dry Sherry which has been seasoned with salt & pepper. After 30 minutes in a fridge discard the liquid. Put 3 tblsp of Olive Oil in a very hot pan and quickly brown the chicken on all sides and then reduce the heat to cook through for a further 5 minutes. Drain the chicken, leave to one side and leave about 2/3 rds of the oil in the pan.

Prepare 3 crushed cloves of Garlic, 2 tblsp of finely chopped fresh root ginger, 1 onion (roughly diced), teaspoon of salt and 1/2 teaspoon of ground black pepper and quickly fry for 1 minute at a high heat and then reduce to cook through for a further 3 minutes.

To the pan add a 750g tin of tomatoes (put aside the liquid at this stage), 50g of stoned black olives and 300ml of chicken stock, tomato puree (a good squeeze). Bring to a simmer and add back the chicken and leave to cook for about 15 minutes. You may have to add some of the tomato liquid to maintain a sauce like consistency. Test to see if the chicken is cooked. Finally add about 20 roughly chopped basil leaves, 2 teaspoons of sugar, and salt & pepper to taste. Cook for about 2 minutes. The dish is now ready to serve.
