







NEW HALL FUNDING UPDATE

Preliminary applications have been made to the County and the Lottery Funding for the new village hall. The decision on the County application will not be made until after April but there has been positive feedback on the project following an on-site visit. In particular the design was felt to make extremely innovative use of the limited space available.

There has been success with the initial stage of the Lottery application and a comprehensive application will be submitted early in January. This will be accompanied by a letter of support from the County. The legal structure of the enterprise has to be a registered charity and assistance is being provided by Martin Cooper in achieving this status. The Charitable Trust will be known as the 'Great Hinton Memorial Hall Trust'.

Our efforts in 1998 will need to focus on applications to smaller sources of funding and of course adding to the £13,000 cash in hand by fund-raising efforts. Following on the successful activities this year when over £2000 was raised, the Hall Committee is already discussing the 1998 Agony Run. The comments made in the Village Survey will help guide the approach and format of this event.



Activities do not have to be on a grand scale and an excellent example was the cake stall at Valerie's Country Wide Workshops Open Day held at the Manor. Cakes and help were provided by the Ladies and as a result £45 was raised. "Thank you -Valerie" for providing this opportunity to generate funds.



If you wish to assist in the planning and organisation then you do not have to be on the Hall Committee to qualify - just enthusiastic!

VILLAGE SURVEY RESULTS

Great Hinton village survey forms were delivered to all houses in the village. Completed surveys were collected in the last weekend of October 1997. Thankyou to everyone who completed the survey. The results are being used to support funding applications for the new hall, as well as allowing us to get a view of peoples interests/needs for the hall, so that we can incorporate facilities for the most popular in to the design.

 $88\ \mathrm{survey}$ forms were delivered. $57\ \mathrm{surveys}$ were completed and returned, giving a 65% response rate.

A summary of the information given in response to the questions is detailed in the following sections.

Number of people in household

Of the households which specified the number of people, the totals for each age group are:



Number of times hall used in last year

77% of households reported some usage of the hall over the last year.


Would the new hall be booked for family events?

Of the 7 households involved with club in the locality, 6 specified that they could possibly make use of the new hall as an additional/alternative site.

Households were asked to detail which clubs they would be interested in joining, if they were available in the village, by giving the number of people interested for each club.



<u>Additional uses that could be located in the new hall involving caring and supporting the local community</u>

The most popular suggestions were for a Toddler group and a Luncheon club for pensioners.

Other activities that could be suitably located in the new hall

Suggestions for other activities that could be suitably located in the new hall included: Indoor Bowls, Craft Classes, Yoga, Line Dancing and Jumble Sales.

Grapevine

Households were asked to indicate their level of satisfaction with the production frequency, content and how willing they were to contribute articles.

96% of households were satisfied (or did not specify) with the production frequency and the content.

47% of households were possibly willing to contribute articles.

Agony Run

46% of households (totalling 49 people) were willing to be actively involved in next year's Agony Run



What improvements could be made to the Agony Run?

Suggestions included:

- Bring back to centre of village (i.e. The Linnet) and make it more of a fun run. Far too
 complicated and professional.
- Possibly intervillage 5 a side football (for children). An organiser has volunteered to manage this event if the field venue is available. This event would also attract more adults to other field events and stalls.
- Start and finish should be the same place.
- More helpers.
- · Not hold it on Fathers' Day!
- Much improved held in Parsons field, but too spread out, needs more side shows and perhaps a band before the race.
- Attract more runners get businesses to enter teams and present a Corporate Challenge Cup.
 Write to firms for entries and sponsorship.
- Condense start/finish area. Clay pigeon shooting. Croquet. Mini golf.
- Separate toddlers run, around main street/back lane.

A great deal of appreciation of the work involved was expressed by organisers and singers so it was all worth while.


The day was a great success with £7000 being raised for the continuing work of Dorothy House.

For those of you new to the village, the Pentathlon is organised over 5 consecutive Saturdays in September when around 10 villages compete against each other in 5 sports. The teams are of mixed ages and sexes in order to involve the whole village. The whole idea of the event is fun and promotion of sport within the community and not necessarily serious competition. The sports change slightly from year to year and so far we have participated in touch rugby, table tennis, unihoc, kwik cricket, swimming, basketball, fun run and a sports quiz.

Great Hinton got off to a good start in 1993 coming 1st out of 11 villages all of which were much bigger in size than ourselves. Unfortunately some of these villages *caught the bug* and the following year delved deeper into their residents to find stronger sportsmen/women and practised in earnest. Consequently we were only 7th in 1994 and again in 1995. We found our talent once more in 1996 and came 3rd. All three trophies - 1st in 1993, 3rd in 1996 and 3rd in 1997 are to be found, along with one for 1st place in the Unihoc in 1993, on display in The Linnet.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Town Planning is the issue that has dominated the Parish Council agenda over the last few months. In considering the response to the draft planning policy the parish councillors found the views expressed, in the parish consultation, to be an invaluable indicator of village opinion. Our thanks to everyone who responded.

There were a small number of people who believed that the village would benefit from some expansion. This was however the minority opinion and there was a clear majority who supported the restriction on development that would come from a tightly drawn village policy limit. The Parish Council have therefore put forward the villagers' views to the District Council and we await the publication of a formal draft policy early in the new year.

Developers proposed the construction of two new houses, fronting Main Street, at New Barn Farm. The Parish Council worked closely with all concerned to try and ensure that the new buildings will have the minimum impact on the village as a whole and the immediate neighbours.

Other issues which have been reviewed include; the continuing problem of hedge cutting (or lack of it) in the Narrow, the Village Hall (the Parish Council are the owners of the land), the speed of through traffic in the village and the council tax precept for 1998,99 (which will be unchanged from this year).

The Parish Council has very few direct powers but is consulted by others on a wide range of local issues, whether by law or voluntarily, and works very closely with our District (Adrian Fox) and County (Doug Firmager) councillors. If you feel that there is any local issue on which we can help or lend our support, please contact any one of your five parish councillors.

THE TROWBRIDGE CHARITY CARD SHOP

Many people from Great Hinton (10 this year) give their time voluntarily to help staff the Charity Card Shop in Trowbridge each year.

The shop, which opens annually for six weeks before Christmas, has now been operating for 27 years.

A unique feature of the shop is that, thanks to the unpaid and voluntary efforts of its supporters, approximately 98% of the shop turnover is currently forwarded directly to the 30 plus charities which supply their cards.


