


Report From Great Hinton Memorial Hall Trust

Fantastic News!

On Wednesday 31st March we received some terrific news.

We were contacted by an official from the 21st Century Halls Fund - an organisation distributing Lottery money for village halls - to tell us that we had been awarded £55,250 towards the building of a new Hall for Great Hinton.



Add this to the money we already have through the village's fund raising efforts over the years, plus grants awarded to us by Wiltshire County Council, West Wilts District Council and Haul Waste, and we have £115,000! This means we now have enough to go full steam ahead with our plans to build a new Hall.

The 21st Century Halls money comes as a result of a detailed and complex application largely assembled and submitted by Chris Munday on behalf of the village. We are very lucky to have Chris's experience and expertise; having secured this award he will continue to make a major contribution to managing the task of building a new Hall.

So where do we go from here?

We have now contracted architects - Quartley, Hodges and Hood - who are developing an exciting design based on the feedback we have received over the last 18 months from many villagers. We are grateful for the different views and ideas that have been put forward over the Hall; all of these ideas have been considered and will shape the final design. Inevitably the final design will be a compromise between what we ideally want, what we can afford and what is possible on a very limited site, but we are working closely with the architects to ensure that this will be a Hall to meet the needs of our community.

If you want an opportunity to look at and comment on the architects' drawings, please come to the Trust's AGM on 28th April.

To sum up, it is going to happen, we are going to have a new Village Hall.

News From The Parish Council

Highways:

As a result of close liaison with the County Highways a CCTV survey of the surface water drain in Back Lane identified a blocked pipe as the cause of the running water that has for so long been a problem. This blockage and a similar problem on the hill at Coldharbour was later cleared by a high pressure drainage cleaner.

Semington By-Pass:

The full plans of this much heralded new road scheme was recently sent to us for information. To the surprise of many, the District Council included, the new road does not terminate at a

roundabout east of the crematorium as expected but continues southward. It is proposed to run behind the crematorium and rejoin the existing road at the foot of Hag Hill.

As a Parish Council we have decided that this unnecessary incursion into the countryside should be resisted as the damage caused is not justified by the claimed benefit. I fear we may be almost a lone voice in taking this view and I would welcome your comments and views.

Elections:

The whole Parish Council are shortly due for re-election. Audrey Plummer who has served on the council for the last 9 years has decided not to stand for another 2 year term. On behalf of the village and my fellow councillors I would like to thank Audrey for the time and effort she has contributed to our community during her time as a councillor.

Nominations for the Parish council close on Thursday 8th April, details from Carol Burch if you are interested, and if there are more than five nominations then elections will be on the same day as for the District Council, Thursday 6th May.

Recure

Bread Pudding - as experienced at the Gourmet evening

- 8 thick slices day old white bread
- ½ pint milk
- 1 eating apple
- 3/4 lb. (12 oz) mixed dried fruit
- 2 oz chopped mixed peel
- 3 tablespoons soft dark brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons mature orange marmalade
- 1 ½ oz self raising flour
- 2 eggs beaten into submission
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 2 level teaspoons ground mixed spice
- 4 oz butter

Break the bread, including crusts, into small pieces, place into a mixing bowl and pour over milk. Leave for 20 minutes.

Beat well with a fork to form a lump free mixture. Core & grate the apple and add with the dried fruit and mixed peel. Stir in the sugar, marmalade, flour, eggs, lemon juice, cinnamon and the mixed spice.

Melt the butter. Stir half into the bread mixture. Beat well using a wooden spoon and spread into a 11" X 8" roasting tin. Pour the remaining butter evenly over the surface of the pudding. Bake in a preheated oven (150 degree C, 300 degrees F, Gas Mark 2) for 2 hours. Then increase the oven temperature to 180 degrees C, 350 degrees F, Gas Mark 4 and bake for a further 30 minutes.
