#### Progress Report on Plans for New Hall

Since we reported to you last, much progress has been made on our plans to build a new Village Hall to replace the existing Hall, although not quite so much progress as we had hoped for at this stage.

We have already reported to you that as a result of a successful bid to the 21st Century Halls fund of the Lottery Commission, we had secured enough money to go ahead with building a new Hall.

This was explained to those of you who came to our Annual General Meeting in April. At that meeting Quartley, Hodges and Hood, the firm we have commissioned to design and manage the building of a new Hall, was represented by Brent Hodges their architect. Brent showed us the latest design for the new Hall and responded to questions from those who attended. Most of the questions concerned the interior of the building; in particular people were keen to see plenty of storage space, a well equipped kitchen area, a Hall long enough for a skittle alley, and a second door in the Hall to act as an emergency exit. It was agreed that all of these issues should be incorporated if practically possible.

One question relating to the exterior of the building was whether the height of the Hall could be reduced by digging out the site of the Hall and building at road level. If we did this it would reduce the internal space in the Hall by having all the rooms on one level, and Brent Hodges advised us that the extra cost in digging out the site, building substantial retaining walls and building the Hall within these walls may take the cost of the Hall beyond our means.

One of the conditions of the Lottery money that we have been awarded is that we get planning permission by 27 August 1999. Consequently we had aimed to get the new Hall plans considered at the July meeting of the Planning Committee. Some of you will be aware of this because as "neighbours" of the Hall you will have been consulted by the District Council. However we had to withdraw our application and it now goes forward to the Planning Committee of 26 August. The reason for this is that we have had to make some small amendments to the Hall design as a result of new information about the size of the site of the Hall.

So, as you can imagine, we are now very keen to secure planning permission at the meeting of 26 August otherwise there is a possibility that we will lose the £55,250 Lottery grant. We obviously need all the support that we can get! We are hoping to get the support of our District Councillor, Adrian Fox, but any letters of support from villagers would be very welcome.

If you want to write, send your letter to the Chief Planning Officer, West Wilts District Council, Bradley Road, Trowbridge BA14 0RD (marked planning reference W99/0877).

One of the possible planning objections to the new Hall is that there is no associated car parking. We are arguing that the new Hall replaces an existing Hall with no parking and that it will mainly serve the villagers living in Great Hinton who live within easy walking distance from the Hall. If you do write you may want to make reference to this issue.

## News From The Parish Council

Open Meeting:

The Parish Council annual open meeting, which was held at the end of June, proved to be one of the liveliest open meetings of recent years. It was clear that there is strong support amongst villagers for the Parish Council's decision to oppose the southern extension of the Semington by-pass. Our County Councillor, Joan Savage, was the lone voice in the hall to defend the County highways department's plans. As soon as we receive notice of the planning application we will hold further village consultations.

Adrian Fox spoke briefly to the meeting about various current district council issues, and Steve Drage introduced himself as our new community policeman. Joan Savage also took the opportunity to explain the legal restrictions, which at present are preventing us from securing a 20mph speed limit in the village.

**Town Planning:** 

Your Parish Council have recently succeeded in its opposition to plans to erect a large barn in a field alongside the "narrows", close to the junction with Stoggy Lane. Normally supporters of rural business, we felt that the proposal was inappropriate for such an elevated, high visibility site. We have also recently strongly opposed plans for new, executive style, houses in the settlement of Bleet.

**Elections:** 

Only three nominations were registered for the recent election, resulting in there being no election and leaving two vacant seats on the Parish Council. I am pleased to report that subsequently Brian Shipman and Mark Newman have volunteered to join the Council.

# New Air Ambulance Needs Your Support

The delivery and commissioning of a new helicopter, the US-built Boeing twin-turbine MD 900 Explorer, marks the beginning of a new era for the Wiltshire Air Ambulance.

As well as being twice as fast as its predecessor, the Bolkow 105, the new Explorer is 10 times quieter, which is good for the environment, good for the crew and good for the patients.

The Explorer has 80 per cent more cabin volume and seating for up to 8 people and will carry 1 stretcher and 3 passengers. The extra space means that more equipment and state-of-the-art medical kit can be carried and stored comfortably.

The Wiltshire Air Ambulance Appeal, which helps to raise the funds to keep the Wiltshire Air Ambulance helicopter flying, needs *your* support as much as ever. The Appeal has to raise £160,000 each year – the equivalent to just over £3,000 a week.

Dennis Lauder, Chief Executive of Wiltshire Air Ambulance Service NHS Trust, says: "After 9 years and more than 3,500 missions the Wiltshire Air Ambulance provides an essential service to the people of Wiltshire. Even today we still rely on your time, support and fund-raising to keep the Air Ambulance flying. This is why it is *your* Air Ambulance."

How can you help? You can raise money by organising an event at your village hall – perhaps 50s night together with a raffle or a bring and buy sale. Or get your parish council to nominate the Wiltshire Air Ambulance Appeal as your village's charity of the year at your village fete. Or you can send in a donation and if you make out a Deed of Covenant for 4 years this will increase the value of your donation to the Wiltshire Air Ambulance Appeal by a third. Best of all, though, you can leave a legacy in your will to the Wiltshire Air Ambulance Appeal – but do consult a solicitor first for advice.
