

Progress Report On The New Village Hall



Well, we have been telling you about it for some time. Now you can see it for yourself. Our old Village Hall has gone and the new Hall is growing before our eyes.

The builders started as planned on 7<sup>th</sup> February. the first task was to demolish and take away the old Hall. For many villagers this must have brought mixed feelings. Some of you will have used the old Hall for social events for many years and some of you will have spent time maintaining and refurbishing it over the years. It may have been old and tatty but it was part of the village scenery. What we do know from the builders is that it did not take long to pull it down; it was no longer safe.

The new Hall, as you can see is growing rapidly. We hope that the builders have not inconvenienced villagers; they are certainly very aware of the need to keep disruption to a minimum and are tidy and well organised, but inevitably there were occasions in the early stages of demolition and the laying of foundations, when lorries had to park in Main Street picking up and delivering skips and cement.

The builders are ahead of schedule by a few days so the target finish date of late June is still likely to be met.

# GREAT HINTON

It is always difficult to imagine what a new building will look like and what size it will be when it is under construction. When completed, the Hall will be larger than the old Hall by about two thirds. Mike Truman, the village artist in residence, has very kindly produced an artist's impression of the Hall, working from the drawings. Thanks Mike and we are all very sorry to hear that you and Ann are moving away from the village.

Once the Hall is completed we will be looking for help in fitting out the building with some work in the kitchen and some finishing of paintwork. We are sure that we can rely on volunteers to help out in late June/early July. If you are willing to help please speak to any members of the Trust Committee (see separate report from the Committee). Finally we will be having an official opening of the building and some early 'christening' activities. We do hope everyone will get involved; now its a bigger and better Hall we can get lots more people into it.

# Report From The Great Hinton Memorial Hall Trust

As you will understand, all the work of the Committee currently is focused on the new Hall Building Project. It is a very significant responsibility and does involve a surprising amount of work particularly for Chris Munday, the Project Leader, who meets regularly with the builders and the architect and has to make complicated monthly submissions for grant funding in line with monthly expenditure.

The funding of the building is based on money raised by the village plus a series of grants. When you are awarded a grant you do not get sent a cheque for the whole amount. Instead you have to make monthly claims to the grant holders to release part of the grant based on very detailed proof of the cost of work undertaken during that month (i.e. builders costs, solicitors costs etc). We are very dependent on the significant amount of work currently being undertaken by Chris.

There have recently been some changes in the membership of the Committee. Kevin Crumpler, who has been closely involved in the Village Hall Project from its most recent inception, made the decision to leave the Committee due to pressure of work. We are very grateful to Kevin for his involvement in the grant submissions and in the Trust Committee. Those of you who know Kevin will be aware of the great enthusiasm and commitment he has for anything he does, and we will miss that. Kevin was the Village Community Committee representative and Derek Saville has kindly agreed to take over as the Community Committee's representative on the Trust Committee.

The other membership change is that Ann Truman is being replaced by Carol Clarke as the Ladies Club representative. Ann and Mike Truman are moving away from the village, but luckily not too far. Those villagers who know them will miss Ann and Mike a great deal. They have both been closely involved in village activities for many years and are two of the most sociable and welcoming people around. I am sure that we all wish them well in their forthcoming move and happiness for the future.

# Great Hinton Parish Council

I am often surprised by the number of planning applications and related matters that arise in Great Hinton , especially as ours is one of the smallest parishes in West Wilts. During the last few months however we have seen an unusually large volume of planning issues, covering matters such as controversial business and agricultural use proposals, routine house extensions and the major highway proposals for a Semington by-pass.

#### **Semington By-Pass**

I would like to thank everyone who visited the display of the Semington By-pass proposals, in the old village hall at the end of January, when there was unanimous opposition to the Southern extension of the road. The formal submission to the County planners supported the principle of a by-pass for Semington village but very strongly objected to extending the new road beyond the A361 Devizes Road. The list of attendees at the January consultation along with a copy of all of the written comments provided by visitors, were attached to the letter from the parish council. We have since heard that the District Council voted to support the proposals in full, despite their discontent over the lack of consultation on the Southern extension. As soon as we hear any further news we will let the village know.

#### Making your voice Heard

The Parish council is only a consultee on planning matters and we also need to make our comments within the framework of planning law. Whilst such formal representation can be effective it can also be limited in conveying the strength of emotions aroused. It is therefore important for people to voice their opinions in as many ways as possible.

I would like to remind people that anyone can make written objections to, or support, planning proposals. The policy of the district council is also such that any member of the public can address the area committee meetings that decide planning applications, notice of which is placed on the village notice board. If you feel strongly about any planning matter please make your views known to a parish councillor but please also make direct contact with the planning department, Adrian Fox (our District councillor), Mrs. Joan Savage (our County councillor), and any other relevant person or organisation. In this way decision makers can be made very clearly aware of your views.

#### **Annual Parish Meeting**

The redevelopment of the village hall means that we will not be able to hold our normal Annual Parish meeting, instead the Parish council will issue a written annual report in early summer. All parish council meetings are open to any parish resident and advance notice and meeting agenda is placed on the village notice board. Whilst we have no hall Parish Council meetings are held in a private home and therefore space at meetings is limited. If at any time you would like to know when the next meeting is to be held or would like to attend a meeting please contact the Clerk, Carol Burch

#### Parish Footpaths - Volunteer Needed

Our public footpaths are an important amenity which are under constant threat from problems of disrepair, blockage etc. The County Council has first class footpaths officers in the highways department who are very good at dealing with landowners and in procuring repair works. # Wiltshire Air Ambulance Appeal

The Year 2000 is the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Wiltshire Air Ambulance and this also coincides with the fact that the Wiltshire Air Ambulance helicopter has now picked up its 1000<sup>th</sup> patient, which you will agree is a notable achievement.

You may already know that, in the Autumn of 1998 the Wiltshire Air Support Unit in Devizes took delivery of a new, faster helicopter, the Boeing MD-900 Explorer, to replace the reliable but ageing Bolkow 105.

For many years the amount of money the Wiltshire Air Ambulance Appeal has had to raise to keep the Wiltshire Air Ambulance flying was fixed at £160,000 a year; unfortunately, this has now risen to an amount in excess of £200,000 a year.

This target is obviously much harder to reach for the Wiltshire Air Ambulance Appeal and therefore any contributions in time or money would be welcome. But, perhaps the most significant way to help the Appeal with its long-term funding is to leave a legacy in a will. If that is the case, it is definitely best to consult a solicitor on this matter. We appreciate that this is a very personal matter for anyone contemplating such a far reaching decision.

We have noted that over the last few years many people have requested that donations be given to the Appeal instead of gifts at wedding anniversaries and flowers at funerals. We feel that this is very beneficial and that this situation will continue.

# Bats In The Belfry - Or Maybe In Your Roof?

This part of Wiltshire lies within the range of one of our rarest and most threatened mammals—the greater horseshoe bat. This pear-sized animal with small, bright eyes and an elaborate nose-leaf, tends to live in buildings in Summer and underground sites in Winter. At dusk it emerges to feed, hunting along hedgerows and over pastures for cockchafers, moths and other large insects. Like other bats it has a sophisticated *echolocation* system, letting out ultrasound squeaks and listening to the echoes coming back, although unlike other bats it goes this through its nose!

The greater horseshoe bat has undergone a drastic decline due to loss of habitat, use of insecticides and disturbance at roosting and hibernation sites; with only 4000 individuals remaining and 14 known breeding roosts in the country. Wiltshire is at the eastern edge of its current range, with the old stone mines around Bradford-on-Avon and at RAF Chilmark, providing nationally important hibernation sites; and a variety of house roofs, barns and boiler rooms providing Summer roost sites. We have a responsibility to look after these important places and perhaps help the bat to re-colonise former areas!

Although a rough distribution map can be compiled and some protection work is done by English Nature involving several Sites of Special Scientific Interest, little else has ever happened in Wiltshire. Overall, information is pretty scanty and out of date. Therefore, the recently initiated Wiltshire Greater Horseshoe Bat Project, run by the Wiltshire Bat Group and Wiltshire Wildlife Trust, with funding from Wessex Water, aims to visit all known roost sites and search for new ones. As a householder in west Wiltshire, your help is needed! Dr. Sarah

Grinsted, the project officer, is out with her bat detector and step ladder, looking for any type of bat roost, as well as greater horseshoe bat roosts, and can provide plenty of free information and advice about bats.
