

In the last edition of the Grapevine I reported that the County Council had granted planning permission for the Semington By-Pass, and I promised that your Parish Council would continue to monitor events. Shortly after that article was written The Department of Transport and the Regions (DETR) published the formal orders required under highways legislation.

Publication of these orders gave The Parish Council the opportunity of submitting to DETR details of our objection to the southern extension, beyond the A361 Devizes Road. The objection submitted reflects the views expressed at the Parish Council's annual meeting in 1999 and the subsequent exhibition and consultation held in the old village hall. We now understand that there is at least one other objection to this section of the route and, as that has come from an affected landowner, DETR must hold a Public Inquiry.

Whilst the Parish Council is regarded as a "nonstatutory" objector we hope that an inquiry will provide the opportunity for our objection to be



considered in detail. In the last few days I have received from the County Council a copy of its "statement of case", which explains the scheme and includes a summary of their reasons for the extending the route south of the A361. I shall be liaising throughout the process with the professional advisers supporting the landowner in order to maximise the impact of our objection.

If you would like to see any of the documents which the County Council are relying upon in support of their case then these are now available for public inspection at The County Council Offices (Corporate Services Department), The District Council Offices, Melksham Library and Semington Post Office. I will also arrange for copies of the Parish Council's correspondence to be available in the new Memorial Hall, from Monday 26th March onwards. I will also ensure that the date of the inquiry is published on the village notice board.

I make no apology that this report is only about the By-pass but if the Southern extension is built in the proposed form it will have a permanent and very serious, adverse affect on the quality of life in Great Hinton.

lean was a quietly vital person, working extremely hard for her family and friends. She gave so much of herself to the life of this village. As a member of the Ladies Club she joined enthusiastically in all activities from Gourmet evenings to skittles, from summer fete to carol singing, not forgetting the Christmas dinner. In latter years Jean instigated the Ladies Club support for Operation Christmas Child, a charity involved in sending shoe boxes filled with Christmas gifts to less fortunate children in Bosnia, Romania, etc. We aim to make an even greater effort with our boxes this year, in Jean's memory. Jean loved the Summer fete, especially dressing up for whatever theme we had chosen to follow.

For fifteen years Jean had worked tirelessly and efficiently as Treasurer to the Great Hinton Memorial Hall and Community Committee. At Agony Run time Jean executed her duties with great proficiency distributing and collecting money, acting as time-keeper and in 1997 she even found time to join the village ladies in the tug-of-war. Yes, Jean was always ready, willing and able.

From its inception fifteen years ago until last year, Jean had helped Min to run the 100 Club - spending <u>many</u> hours collecting annual subscriptions, then organising the monthly prizes, a job which she continued to do even after relinquishing her role as treasurer.

lean had a great love of the natural world, particularly bird life. She was so excited the first year we became aware of a pair of blackcaps visiting our bird-tables. She loved to see the long-tailed tits and goldcrests which are about from time to time...

As a neighbour Jean was very caring and had been a great support to me personally. At least two or three times a week she would appear at my back door checking that I was OK. Like many of you in the village I shall always remember Jean's warm, cheerful personality and I shall miss her for a long time to come.

A Tribute to Chris

Perhaps not so many people in the village knew Chris as well as they knew Jean. But Chris was always there, giving support when it was needed.

Unfortunately, Christopher's retirement was dogged by ill-health. The very week Chris retired he contracted double pneumonia and pleurisy, followed very shortly by shingles, all of which was very debilitating. In spite of this he was always quietly supportive of Sandy in all her activities.

Whenever Sandy served teas and refreshments at both the Ladies Club fete and the Agony Run, Chris would be there unobtrusively in the background, lifting, carrying, transporting etc. When Sandy entertained Dorothy House patients to lunch Chris would be seen negotiating wheelchairs in and out of confined spaces and escorting patients to and from their transport.

Chris was a stalwart member of the British Legion, for the last few years chairing the local branch. He worked hard to maintain an active, lively branch with a good membership.

For several years Chris was treasurer to the Charity Card Shop in the six week run-up to Christmas. Chris was always ready to put pen to paper, to whoever it concerned to protect our rural life and for the benefit of our village in particular. He organised the petition in aid of our beautiful new Village Hall.

Chris loved his garden and spent many hours tending his particular interest - his vegetable plot. His other great interest was fishing and many a fresh trout found its way to a local event as a raffle prize.

In the last five years Chris had suffered from various forms of cancer - I say suffered in the strictest sense of the word as I think Chris had much more pain than anyone realised, particularly in his last few months.

On a personal note I had great support from Chris over the last sixteen years, particularly when it came to writing official letters - he always knew exactly the right thing to say. And who will sharpen my knives now - a job Chris always performed excellently!

As with Jean, Chris will be sadly missed and long remembered by all who knew him.

WILTSHIRE CONSTABULARY

Hello, I am Mark Gale, your new Community Beat Officer.

I would like to take a few moments of your time just to explain what my role is and what we can do to help each other.

As the Community Beat Officer, my role is mainly involved in dealing with local issues which affect your particular area and quality of life. I am also involved in Public Consultation such as Parish Council meetings and Neighbourhood Watch. I also look at how to deal with ongoing matters on a long-term basis, not just to deal with each incident as a single problem.

If you are experiencing problems where you require the assistance of the Police, it will not always be me who will come and see you or be dealing with the incident. You will still receive a visit from another officer from Trowbridge, and I will then be made aware of ongoing matters and may be responsible for any necessary follow-up enquiries.

Should you wish to report a crime, a road traffic collision or something suspicious, you should telephone *Trowbridge Police Station on 01225 763101*, or *Police Headquarters on 01380 722341*. You will normally be connected to our Crime Desk who will record the details from you, or to the Control Room who can send an officer should it be felt necessary to do so.

If you are reporting something suspicious, please try to tell us exactly what makes the person or incident suspicious. An example, for instance, may be that a house in the area has recently been burgled and there is now a person sat in a car sat outside unoccupied premises. Please tell us exactly that, and not like some people do just saying there is a suspicious car in the road.

If you witness a crime that requires immediate and urgent attention, for example someone breaking into a house or a car, phone 999.

If you have witnessed something that is not urgent but wish to pass on information, please phone Trowbridge Police Station or *CRIMESTOPPERS* on 0800 555 111. You can remain anonymous should you wish, and you may also be entitled to a Crimestoppers Reward.

If you wish to speak to me personally, please contact me at Trowbridge Police Station or leave me a message and I will contact you.

Don't forget, Neighbourhood Watch Schemes are an excellent way of preventing crime, so if you are not in one, why not get together with your neighbours and start one? I can provide you with details of your local co-ordinator and send you all the details you will need



The April lunch will have an Easter theme and will be on **Thursday 19th at 12.30 for 12.45**. We have decided to call a halt during the summer, when people are busy gardening or drifting away on holiday. We shall resume activities in September.



We'd like to say many thanks to Les Stimpson for donating some large saucepans and a really big colander. Gwen and Doris have donated some cruet sets. Hilary and Anne have given serving dishes surplus to requirement at home and David and Sylvia & Stan have donated wine glasses - many thanks to all these generous people. Added to this we have purchased from various funds tablecloths, three extra serving dishes and serving spoons. This all helps to make life easier at our various events.

The Trust is the small group that is responsible for the financial management and upkeep of the Memorial Hall.

Since the new Hall was built the use being made of it has increased significantly, which is clearly what we had all hoped for. Finishing off the Hall is not yet complete however. There are two aspects to this; firstly work still to be completed by the builder and secondly work we need to complete ourselves.

We have not yet paid the final instalment to the builder. This is normal in a project of this kind. After the building is handed over by the builder we wait for a period of about six months during which we identify 'snags' or problems with the building. We have identified a number of these, the major ones being:

 the wooden Hall floor lifting slightly because of expansion

- the steps of the main stairs up to the Hall being of different heights
- a faulty fire alarm.

Some of these have already been sorted out by the builder and the remaining ones are soon to be done.

Meanwhile we have made our final claim for grant funding for the building from the Lottery Commission. This leaves us with around £1900 to undertake some work we have to pay for ourselves. This includes putting up a safety rail to the front of the building, and a fence along the path to the side of the Hall.

In addition we still need to complete the internal painting of the Hall. Much of this is done but we still need a final effort. Please note the dates for decorating 'parties' and give a few hours of your time.

Quiz Evening you will have the chance to buy a plot for £1 to see whether you are the lucky prospector. All proceeds will go to the Community Committee for hall equipment.



For 10' Flan dish. Serves 8-10


1 Jar of Golden Syrup (680gms) Approx 3/4lb rich short crust pastry Breadcrumbs from small <u>un-cut</u> white loaf - minus crusts Juice and zest of 1/2 Jemon



Line flan dish with the pastry - not too thinly rolled out - lightly prick base.

Put crumbs in largish basin, add syrup, lemon juice and zest and mix very well. Add more crumbs if necessary - make sure all coated with syrup.

Put into pastry case and decorate with pastry lattice pieces Bake 30-40 mins in hot oven - approx 180deg.C Serve hot with Bird's custard or cream. Freezes well. All amounts approximate - I rarely measure anything!!


THE FEATHERS ARE FLYING ON FRIDAY NIGHTS

A letter from our Vicar at Steeple Ashton

Dear Friends.

Rejoice in the Lord always

I wonder why it is that people seem to think that living the Christian life means being gloomy and dull. I am writing this as the season of Lent begins, which tends to be associated in people's minds with giving up things, e.g. sweets, or visits to leisure pursuits of various kinds. In fact Jesus says to us, "I have come that you might have JOY and have it in abundance". This joy is not associated with possessions, but comes from a living relationship with Jesus himself. The purpose of Lent is that we might give more time to looking at that relationship and to ways in which it can be deepened. This will mean time and effort and it may mean that we have to give up other things for a while in order that this can happen. It really amounts to giving up things which may well be good in themselves, so that we can possess something which is even better, and will last for ever.

Lent is also a time when we prepare ourselves to look more closely at the meaning of Good Friday and to enter afresh into the JOYFUL time of Easter and resurrection and new life. There may be trials and tribulations to face in our daily lives, but Jesus promises to be with us in these. One of the most joyful letters in the New Testament is the one Paul wrote to the Philippians. He was in prison at the time and facing possible death. He longed to go on living and caring for others, but he could also write that 'to depart and to be with Jesus would be far better'.

May you experience something of the joy Jesus came to bring.

<u>Chicken Bake</u> Serves 4-6 people This recipe was in the Grapevine some years ago but members of Lunch Club have requested a re-print

too liquid.

4 large chicken breasts - cut into bite size pieces
Approx.4 ozs thickly sliced mushrooms
1 large onion sliced
Clove of garlic crushed, if liked.
1 can Campbells condensed soup - chicken,
mushroom or celery are very nice.
3 tablespoons double cream (or yoghurt)

4 tablespoons Chicken stock (approx)

3 ozs grated cheese

Large packet of crisps, broken up (Kettle or Pringles good, any flavour)

Parsley, salt and pepper to taste.

Broccoli, slightly steamed and/or frozen corn, peas, cooked carrot or own choice of vegetables (courgettes not good) Lightly cook chicken pieces in olive oil, put in large bowl.
Fry off onions and garlic and mushrooms (if required) add to bowl.
Add corn and other veg. (not broccoli) to bowl. Mix well.
Then mix in condensed soup, stock, cream and seasonings until everything is well coated. Check consistency - doesn't need to be

Put in large gratin dish, then add broccoli florets.

Cover with grated cheese and crisps. Finish with grated parmesan if liked.

Bake in moderate oven approx 35-40 minutes.

Freezes well - but don't add the crisps and cheese at this stage. Defrost completely before baking.

This versatile recipe can be adapted to any ingredients you like amounts not important. I've just mentioned the ones we like!
