Best Kept Village Competition Result

In a recent circular I reported that we had been judged the best kept small village in West Wiltshire, and as a consequence judging for the County wide competition was in early July.

I have just heard that we are this year's runners up, coming in second behind the North Wilts village of Grittleton. Though a little disappointing that we didn't quite make the top spot, second is a great improvement on our fourth place last year. Unlike many villages we do not organise work parties to prepare for the visit of the judges, rather the result is a reflection of the care and pride in our environment put in throughout the year.

The Public Inquiry opens on Tuesday 31st July in the Melksham Assembly Rooms. The Parish Council has submitted a written proof of evidence to the Inquiry, outlining our objection to the extension of the new road across open countryside to the south of the A361 (Devizes Road). AND FINALLY.....THE RECIPE OF THE MONTH

<u>Mozart Ice-cream</u> (chocolate) (a Safari Dinner recipe request) (Serves 8)

110g (3½ oz) chocolate and hazelnut spread 2 eggs beaten 30g (1 oz) ground hazelnuts 1 teaspoon lemon juice 1 tablespoon almond liqueur 300ml (10 fl oz) double cream 60g (2 oz) icing sugar Whipped cream and grated chocolate to decorate.



- Spoon chocolate and hazelnut spread into a heatproof bowl which fits over a saucepan. Stand bowl over a pan of
 gently simmering water and stir constantly until melted. Whisk until smooth.
- 2. Allow chocolate mixture to cool slightly then stir in beaten eggs, a little at a time to keep the mixture smooth.
- 3. Place ground hazelnuts in a bowl. Stir in lemon juice and liqueur, then stir into chocolate mixture.
- 4. Whip cream with icing sugar until stiff. Gradually fold in hazelnut mixture.
- Unless using a free-standing ice-cream maker, spoon ice cream mixture into a deep 1 litre (1¾ pt) polythene freezer container.
- 6. Freeze mixture for 2 hours or until ice crystals have formed around the edges and mixture has started to solidify. Remove from freezer and beat until smooth.
- 7. Cover ice cream and return to freezer until solid.
- 8. Serve in scoops, decorated with whipped cream and grated chocolate. Offer dessert biscuits, if liked.

You should find the ice cream doesn't go rock hard, so you can serve it straight from the freezer.
