#### The latest news

Some of you will have seen the email sent from Colin, but for those of you who haven't here is a brief summary of what he is up to.

Having survived getting up at 5.30 am, walking with a heavy rucksack, leaking tents, altitude sickness and 10 inches of snow on the tent one morning, he seems to be enjoying himself. He has seen wild boar, rhino and deer, been on an elephant ride, visited various temples and some villages and been white water rafting. trekking the group take it in turns to be leader for the day so at times he is in charge!! Bearing in mind that Snowdon is 900m, he has been up several peaks a lot higher than this already - one of 4500m. They have completed a short trek of 12 days, which included the 'sight-seeing bits' and a training trek of about two and a half weeks, when they started on the higher peaks. At the moment the third trek is taking them to Everest Base Camp and should last for the whole of March.

The intention was to go to a village prior to this third trek and build some latrines for them; however there were 600 maoists camped out there and they could not go. Work was found for the group at a Mother Teresa's Old People's Home in Kathmandu where they had to scrub floors, make beds and entertain the old people.

Hopefully once Colin returns he will be able to write a much more interesting report for the next issue of the Grapevine.

## GREAT HINTON MEMORIAL HALL TRUST

Now we have the new village hall, the work of the Trust has changed and quietened down a little. We continue to work in partnership with the Community Committee to ensure that we have enough money coming in to cover the running costs of the Hall, and to see the Hall used as much as possible, particularly by people from the village and surrounding area.

The one continuing problem we have with the Hall which, as I write we are still trying to get solved, is a fault in the alarm system. This has become a source of much frustration for all of us as the contractors have appeared to solve the problem on a number of occasions only for the fault to reappear after a few weeks. We can offer our thanks to those people who turn out to reset the alarm when it goes off, but what we must do is achieve a permanent solution to the problem as soon as possible.

After much deliberation over how to cope with cleaning the Hall we have taken the decision to employ someone for a few hours a month to do this

job. This has already resulted in a very significant improvement in the state of the Hall and we will continue with this arrangement.

Occasional and regular lettings of the Hall continue to increase with the latest regular event being the fortnightly Whist Drives organised by Richard Andrews.

Working with the Community Committee we are just about to make an application for Lottery funding to upgrade the kitchen in the Hall. When the Hall was built the kitchen was not a priority because money was tight. Events in the Hall are now demanding more and better kitchen equipment; for example the regular Lunch Club is very successful and providing hot meals for 20 plus members is almost impossible in the present kitchen.

We will be holding our AGM in early May. Look out for an announcement on the date and time of the meeting on the Village Notice Board and outside the Hall.

# **GREAT HINTON PARISH COUNCIL**

#### Semington By-Pass

The decision of the Public Inquiry was published just before Christmas. As you will probably know the Secretary of State decided to allow the proposal, including the extension South of the A361 (Devizes Road) that we and others objected to.

The Appeal Inspector took account of our objection but concluded that the benefit of the Southern extension outweighed any environmental impact. In particular the Inspector commented in his report; "...that little noise should be expected (in Great Hinton village) and I believe that, with time, the extensive planting would soften what limited noise and visual effects there might be."

We can only hope that the impact on our environment is indeed limited but I fear that the reality will be as intrusive as we originally suspected. Anyone who would like to see the full report should contact Chris Munday.

Construction work has already started with the building of a temporary diversion of the Canal, with the full contract likely to commence this year.

#### Council Tax

We all received our Council Tax bill a few weeks ago, and I am sure that you will have seen that the funding of the Parish Council has leapt by 63.1%. This increase will result in the Parish Council receiving total funding of £2,500.

As outlined in the last edition of the Grapevine the shelter at the village bus stop was destroyed last year and the Council have decided that we need to replace it. With this in mind we needed an extra

£1,000 in our budget in order to meet the construction cost. Investigations have so far shown that a timber structure is likely to be too expensive, whilst a metal frame with plastic glazing would be inappropriate in a rural setting. The probable solution will be to build a simple block-work structure with sloping roof, similar to the previous shelter.

We also face other minor increased costs such as insurance premium and an increase from £200 to £250 for the grass cutting, at the entrance to the village. From the comments that I have received I think a majority share the Parish Council's view that the contractor did an excellent job last summer, achieving a consistent quality that we haven't seen for quite a number of years.

#### Highway Maintenance

The County Council "Parish Lengthsmen" are due to visit us again at the beginning of May so if you are aware of a small repair or other task please let one of your Parish Councillors know.

#### Best Kept Village

We have once again entered the best kept village competition. Judging is based on maintenance and tidiness of public facilities (such as the Hall, Phone Box, Notice Board Village pump etc) and public spaces (the roadways, verges etc). The judges also take into account boundary fences and hedges and also private gardens visible from the road. If together we can maintain, or even improve, the standards of previous years we can once again do well remember we won the district round last year and only just fell short of the County prize. Judges usually arrive in late May.
