#### Parish Highways

As many of you will know there was a serious road accident between a car and heavy lorry a few weeks ago on the corner outside "Quilkins", at the top of the hill in Coldharbour. Fortunately - and miraculously - the car driver from our village was not seriously injured on this occasion, though it has highlighted how potentially dangerous this "blind" corner can be.

The Parish Council meeting on 4<sup>th</sup> December will consider what representations we should make to the County Highways Authority as we open a campaign to improve safety on this narrow, twisting stretch of road. The options available would seem to be to:

- Press for the re-introduction of the 7.5 tonne weight limit that was temporarily in force earlier this year;
- Argue the case for greatly improved warning signage on both approaches to the corner;
- Propose the installation of an improved, antiskid, road surface; etc.

As a Council we will be liaising with Keevil Parish, Trevor Carbin (our County Councillor) and Adrian Fox (District Councillor) in order to ensure co-ordination and maximum impact. If you have any thoughts as to how road safety at this corner or indeed any other location around the village can be improved, then please contact any of your parish councillors.

With winter upon us now, we once again face the prospect of months of damage to the road edges, and the resultant muddy road surfaces, both through the village and on the approach roads. Consequently I would like to appeal for everyone to reduce traffic speed, so that passing can be undertaken more carefully.

## **Bus Shelter**

Nothing has been finalised on the bus shelter. Various design ideas have been investigated, including styles of pre-fabricated shelters, and we are now looking at having something built to order. There is also a possibility of some grant assistance. We hope that the new shelter which is finally chosen will be built in early Spring.



# GREAT HINTON MEMORIAL HALL TRUST

Since the last Grapevine report, the finishing touches have been put to the interior decorations of the Hall. In addition you may have noticed a great improvement to the front door. Our initial choice of colour and type of paint did not give the good quality finish that we wanted for the entrance to our Hall so Mike Truman took on the front door as a project and has done an excellent job.

We have now replaced the wooden chairs in the Hall with new plastic chairs. Many of the old chairs have had to be scrapped over the last year as they are delaminating and becoming dangerous. The new chairs were funded through the Community Committee with the money that was left over from the Jubilee Day Auction of Promises. We have also had a good quality fence erected along the west boundary of the Hall and will eventually need to erect a fence at the rear of the building.

We are still trying to get funding to upgrade the Hall kitchen to make it easier to cater for greater numbers. Our first grant application was unsuccessful but we have reapplied to the same fund and also put forward an initial application to an alternative source of funding. At the same time we are hoping to get financial support to replace the wooden tables in the Hall - new tables to go with our new chairs.

We will keep you informed of all these developments through the Grapevine, but if you want more information please contact me.

Our thanks go to Judy and Colin Ramsey for donating the hostess trolley and china to the Hall as they downsize and get ready to move onto a narrow boat.
