# **Great Hinton Parish Council**

Parish Council Elections - May 2003

When nominations closed for the Parish council elections there were just 5 candidates for the 5 available council seats. This meant that the existing councillors were re-elected unopposed. councillors who will serve the parish for the next four years are: Diane Norris; Mary Clipson; Mark Newman; Brian Shipman (Deputy Chairman) and Chris Munday (Chairman). If there are any local issues of concern to you please contact any one of your Parish Councillors. Whilst our direct powers are limited the parish council must be consulted by law on some matters, such as town planning, and can be a credible representative of community concerns.

**Annual Parish meeting 2003** 

The Parish Council held its Annual Parish Meeting in the village hall on the evening of Wednesday 25th June. The meeting was well attended by some 18 parish residents and our guests on the evening were Mrs Fortescue, our newly elected District Councillor, and Trevor Carbin, our County Councillor.

The open debate covered a wide range of village issues which resulted in the agreement of some clear priorities for action by the Parish Council:

Traffic Speed in The Village

Trevor Carbin confirmed that the Government have still not published new guidelines on use of 20mph speed limits, in the meantime our existing limit could not be lowered.

Many present were concerned at both the increasing volume and speed of traffic. On the question of volume we are monitoring whether the Semington bypass works causes a major increase.

We are to investigate opportunities for joining a "community speed watch" scheme, which could provide real evidence of any speeding which would then be a basis for more police action.

#### **Fore Street Farm**

A number of people were concerned at the rapid deterioration of overgrowth and general important, historic building following Kath Berrett's death last year. It is believed that the house is "listed" and that most of the farmyard lies outside the draft village limits area. Consequently the existing house and site should be protected inappropriate or over development. In the meantime the council will write to the planning officer asking that they monitor the maintenance of the property.

Highways

The parish council undertook to continue to work with adjoining parishes and press our campaign for a speed limit around Strand, between the Lamb and Littleton. The Parish Council and Keevil PC may have an opportunity to bring forward improved road signage at the top of Coldharbour subject to agreeing financial contributions. Following the resurfacing the highways are to white line the road edges on the corner, which will serve to emphasise the narrowness of the road.

#### **Other Matters**

A number of people were concerned that the refuse storage at the rear of the Linnet was, at best, untidy. Following the meeting Jonathan has agreed to review how his waste is managed and in particular will investigate ways of compressing cardboard.

The parish is currently without a footpaths officer. One of the responsibilities of such a person is to arrange an annual "parish path walk" which ensures that our traditional rights of way are maintained and establishes whether any repairs are required. I am hoping that someone will volunteer to help organise a footpath walk on a Sunday morning in early autumn. If you could help please call me or any of the Parish councillors


We should try and make 'Silver' our theme by having silver table decorations etc if at all possible. Or you could really go to town and dress in silver!

# Bonfire advice from the District Council

There is nothing better at the end of a day in the garden to light a bonfire and have the pleasant waft of smoke to remind you of your labours (if your aching back has not already done so!) However for your neighbours the drifting pall of smoke will not be so pleasant and the District Council receives numerous complaints each year about excessive smoke. So please follow their guidelines:

- Don't light bonfires on days when people are likely to be using their gardens or hanging out washing. When possible restrict bonfires to the evenings, after 6 p.m.
- Don't leave bonfires to burn unattended and don't bank them up overnight.
- Site bonfires as far away as possible from neighbouring houses and think about the wind direction.
- Only burn garden waste if it is dry. Don't forget you can recycle garden waste at the district's three household waste recycling centres in Melksham, Trowbridge and Warminister, or you can compost it.
- Recycle what you can rather than burn it, especially paper.
- Don't burn plastics, paint, rubber or roofing felt as all may emit harmful substances. It is an offence to cause the emission of dark/black smoke.
- Keep a water supply or fire extinguisher close at hand.

# GREAT HINTON MEMORIAL HALL TRUST

Since the last Grapevine we have received some excellent news. Our current objectives for the Hall are to upgrade the kitchen and to replace the old heavy wooden tables with lightweight, folding tables. As always the problem has been funding these projects, and we have had one unsuccessful attempt at getting some support from a Lottery based fund. However we have now been successful in an application for support from the Millennium Commission, another Lottery based agency.

The Commission has awarded us £1965, as long as we can match that grant with another £1965 from our own fund raising. We will be able to match this grant from our existing funds plus additional contributions from the Community Committee, the Lunch Club and the Ladies Club.

The Ladies Club has donated £414, which is 50% of the proceeds from their Village Fete held on 12 July. So, thank you to the Ladies for putting together such an enjoyable and successful fete, and thanks to all of you who attended and spent their money there.

We are now planning the upgrade to the kitchen so that large scale catering events can be organised safely and efficiently, and we anticipate that the funds we have available will also allow us to start to replace the old tables.

Meanwhile the Hall continues to be used regularly by a growing number of groups for both regular and occasional events. We hope that upgrading the kitchen will give an opportunity for more and different events to be run in the Hall.

Thanks should be given to those currently working on the kitchen project, in particular Mike Truman, Derek Saville and David Harnott, and also thanks to Doris and Derek Saville for donating an excellent double oven and hob to the project to add to the fridge they donated some time ago.



# MOZART CHOCOLATE ICE

This symphony of flavours will ensure that a special meal ends on a high note!!!! It is a delicious ice-cream that can be scooped straight from the freezer (because of the alcohol content).

- 110g (3.1/2 oz) chocolate and hazelnut spread
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 30g (1oz) ground hazelnuts
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon almond liqueur
- \* 300ml (10fl oz) double cream
- 60g (2oz) icing sugar

- Spoon chocolate and hazelnut spread into a heatproof bowl which fits over a saucepan. Stand bowl over a pan of gently simmering water and stir constantly until melted. Whisk until smooth.
- Allow chocolate mixture to cool slightly, then stir in beaten eggs, a little at a time, so that mixture remains smooth.
- 3. Place ground hazelnuts in a bowl. Stir in lemon juice and liqueur, then stir into chocolate mixture.
- 4. Whip cream with icing sugar until stiff. Gradually fold in hazelnut mixture.
- 5. Unless using a free-standing ice cream maker, turn freezer to coldest setting. Spoon ice cream mixture into a deep 1 litre polythene freezer container.
- Freeze mixture for 2 hours or until ice crystals have formed around the edges and mixture has started to solidify. Remove from the freezer and beat until smooth.
- 7. Cover ice cream and return to freezer until solid. Return freezer to normal setting.
- 8. Serve in scoops, decorated with whipped cream and grated chocolate.
