Annual Open Meeting

The Parish Council held its annual open meeting in the memorial hall on Wednesday 15th June. We were joined by our new County Councillor, Julia Swabey, and though there was only a relatively small turnout of villagers we held an interesting debate on Highway Safety, particulary in relation to the access to the village from the Lamb and from the A350 at Coldharbour and Stoney Gutter. The meeting also strongly urged the Parish Council to lobby on the issue of car parking availability and charges in Trowbridge.

The Council presented its financial report for the year to 31st March 2005, highlighting once again that the main issues that were our primary concerns during the year related to road safety, town planning and road and footpath maintenance. We were pleased to also report that the Parish Council Precept, the amount of money added to your Council Tax to cover our expenditure, had for the third year running been held at £1,100.

You will I am sure have noticed the significant improvement in the cutting of the grass verges at the southern entrance to the village. After being badly let down by our contractor last year we have awarded the contract to a new gardener who will provide us with a total of 10 cuts during the growing season.

Bus Shelter

Considerably later than we had hoped for, the new bus shelter is finished. The total cost was £3,400, of which half was covered by a grant from Wiltshire County Council. Nonetheless it remains the single biggest capital expenditure ever made by your parish council. Be assured that this new structure is fully insured should it fall victim, like the old one, to a hit and run accident.

Fore Street Farm

The council are fully supportive of the owners' attempts to secure Planning and Listed Building consent for what we consider to be a very sensitive restoration and modernisation of one of the most prominent houses in our small village. We hope that the District Council will soon grant consent and allow early progress on the work.

Best Kept Village Competition

As we go to press we have just heard that we have won the best small village accolade in West Wilts and now go on to be judged at the county level.

I welcome any comments on the state of the footpaths and ask that if you have any problems then let me know, it is best to give me a grid reference - I use OS Map 156 but I hope to get a larger scale published on the Parish Notice Board later this year.

SPEED LIMIT REVIEW

The Department for Transport consultation closed in mid-February. The consulation document didn't propose any radical changes in speed limit criteria, and wouldn't help with calls for 20mph limits in villages like Coulston and Great Hinton.

County's response to the consultation was rather tame (see Regulatory Committee Feb 2nd), so I made a separate submission on behalf of the opposition suggesting the guidance places too little value on the amenity and safety of residents and vulnerable road users. The document also perpetuates the system whereby people need to be killed or injured before anything is done on a stretch of road.


