Best Kept Village Competition



FOOTPATHS

I have previously described my role as Footpaths Officer; it is to walk the footpaths and keep an eye out for stiles that are obstructed, paths that are overgrown and any other problems that might occur. As there are around 10 miles of footpaths within the parish I also rely on others to spot points of interest and pass them to me.

Current points of interest: (1) the footpath (No. 16) that runs across Fore Street Farm and at the back of Peppercorn Orchard – the Parish Council is in discussion with the planners as to whether the proposed barn will require a minor diversion of the route or whether the barn could be re-sited. (2) a continuation of the same footpath which runs ENE towards the northern end of Stoggy Lane is obstructed by an electric fence – the District Footpaths Officer has been informed of this.

The Parish Council should soon obtain an electronic version of the footpaths within Great Hinton – I am not sure of the copyright issues but I think this should make life a little easier for residents to see the range of footpaths within the Parish. At the very least there should be a copy for the Notice Board but as yet I do not know when this electronic version will be available.

Any points on footpaths please let me know.
