### The closure of the Linnet

After 250 years Great Hinton has lost its famous pub. In its last 10 years Jon Furby created a reputation for his prize-winning dishes and friendly staff and we wish him well in his culinary career.

The Linnet's original name was the New Inn and in the County Records Office there is a 1766 inventory of possessions for John Kingman, a victualler of Hinton, who must have been innkeeper of the New Inn. A brewhouse was added in 1816 and for nearly 100 years the inn was run by just two families. The first Wiltshire Directory to include Great Hinton was published in 1848 and lists Stephen Sims. From 1867 to 1875 Mrs Sims, probably his widow, took over. John Langley is listed as a brewer and latterly a bootmaker from 1880 to1907. In the last published Wiltshire Directory, it is recorded that from 1911 to 1939 Howard John Langley also brewed and made cider with the large cider press at the house. The pub was taken over by Wadworth's in the 1950s, when brewing here would have ceased. Local memory says that they renovated it and changed the name to the Linnet in the early 1970s.

However there are other records which suggest a slightly different history. Occasional references to clothiers at Semington have been found. William Witcom was fined for defective white cloth in 1562. Daniel Somner who died around 1604 was a clothier of Semington, and so was Henry Coulthurst who was in business around 1710. Spinning and weaving was carried on as a domestic occupation until the 19th century and although no reference to the cloth trade in Great Hinton can be found, there is a report about "a small factory building, dated 1815, adjoining the New Inn. It is of brick, of five bays and three stories with a mansard roof, and has the segmental-headed windows with stone mullions typical of mills in the neighbouring towns. It is named as a factory in 1841, when it was owned and occupied by Stephen Sims, and the tradition that it was used for the making of cloth survives in the village."

So what of the future? No longer viable as a pub restaurant in these days of increased competition and more reliance on passing trade, we are fortunate that the Linnet has come into the ownership of Steve Adams who has sympathetically restored Fore Street farmhouse to a very high standard of design and quality workmanship. As a Grade 2 listed building there will be certain restrictions on what can be done to the old pub and any changes to the site, and if and when the time comes the Parish Council will have the opportunity to make its comments in the planning process on our behalf.

### **Parish Council Report**

You will all be aware that I have taken over the role of Chairman from Chris Munday. Chris has served assiduously in this role over the past 17 years, and we all owe him a vote of thanks for his hard work and attention to detail during this period. His resignation from the council has left a vacancy and, after posting a notice calling for nominations for the post of councillor, we are now in the enviable position of having a number of potential candidates. Since our numbers are constrained to a total of five, we are about to start the process of making our selection.

The Annual Open Parish meeting was well attended, and gave people the opportunity to air their views and comments. Closure of the Linnet was high on the agenda, and Steve Adams explained how and why he decided to purchase the pub and its car parks.

The telephone kiosk has finally been put into use. Many thanks go to John Propert for supplying the materials, constructing and

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installing the bookshelves (together with a number of books). Many more books have now been donated and our "mini-library / book-exchange" is fully operational. Gill Verschoyle has volunteered to act as librarian.

One of the key activities undertaken by the Parish Council over the past few weeks has been compiling a response to the Wiltshire Council Core Strategy Consultation Document. The document was extremely large and covered proposals for the whole of Wiltshire for the period up to 2026. We concentrated primarily on issues which were likely to impact most on our parish. These included the planned growth and massive development of Trowbridge and its environs, and the proposed abolition of small village boundaries. A questionnaire was issued to the community and the results incorporated into our response. The overwhelming majority opinion was that our village boundary should be retained, and that the development of Trowbridge should be severely constrained using brown-field sites wherever possible. A copy of the Parish Council's overall submission is available for anyone to see if they wish.

We have also had a useful meeting with the Highways Authority concerning safety issues at the A361/C232 junction at the Strand. Two options for change have been identified, and a questionnaire will be issued to the community in the near future to determine preferences. Once we receive and collate the results, further dialogue will be held with the Highways Authority. Action, however, may take longer!

Finally, it is our intention to initiate action to develop a Parish Plan or a Parish Design Statement. When completed, either will act as a framework for shaping the future of our community and can be very effective in helping the process of dealing with planning proposals. Ideally, the compilation of these documents should be driven by the community rather than by the Parish Council. We will, however, be instrumental in getting one or the other under way.

# Traffic Speed

Having been told that our average traffic speed through the village does not qualify to be restricted to 20 mph I was interested to see that Great Cheverill has placed 20mph signs through the village, despite having pavements and street lighting. This caused me to brake on my bike to avoid exceeding the limit. Why cannot Great Hinton be treated the same, and whilst considering the improvements to the junction at the Lamb extend the speed limit restriction through the narrows? Ironically, having survived the blind corners for 20 years, the nearest I have come to disaster in a car was avoiding two cyclists taking a corner too wide. It is helpful that some of the white junction lines have been renewed on the village roads but the SLOW sign which was painted on the road at the top end of the village has long since vanished under repeated resurfacing.

### **Neighbourhood Watch News**

A very big thank you to all NHW distributors for passing on the newsletters and for forwarding the rural crime information on to your neighbours.

We seem to be hearing more and more news of burglaries and telephone/internet scams with the more recent crimes being thefts of commercial parts and vehicles at both Steeple Ashton and Littleton - a little too close to home.

Only the other evening I had a call from a villager who was concerned about a man going door to door in the village trying to get people to sign up to donating to the Red Cross. He asked a lot of personal information and the lady had a very hard job getting rid of him. He was very persistent and his attitude was described as appalling. He also told each person that their neighbours had signed paperwork and got quite angry when she turned him away. This incident was reported to the police and I am unsure at this point whether he was genuinely from the Red Cross or not.

ANYONE who goes Door-to-Door must carry identification which has a photo ID and a contact number to the business's head office or otherwise, which can be called to verify the authenticity of the caller. A householder is perfectly within their rights to ask to see this ID; if they do not have this, then they have every right to turn them away. No questions. If someone is selling at the door, again they need a licence to do this. Every householder is entitled to see this and can verify the authenticity by calling the company who they represent. If there is ANY doubt whatsoever about this person, call the Police or a neighbour whilst you are checking out the details. Make sure the front door is closed whilst you do this. If they are legitimate, they will remain whilst they are being checked out. If they are not happy about the householder doing this then fine, close the door and let them be on their way...after first making a mental note about what they are wearing and then calling the Police or your NHW Coordinator.

It is only with you, the villagers, being vigilant and keeping a close eye on the more vulnerable within our community, that we can try and keep crime in Great Hinton at bay. You have all done a fantastic job phoning through information on 'door knockers' and vehicles and I hope you continue to do so. I will of course text up to date information to everybody I have mobile phone numbers for so that you are made aware of anything occurring in the village.

### Why dial 101?

From 19 September as part of the National roll out, communities across Wiltshire will be able to dial 101, a new national non-emergency telephone number for the police service. The current non emergency number 0845 408 7000 will be phased out. While 999 is a well recognised number to report emergencies, the 2010 British Crime Survey found that only 54 per cent of the public knew which telephone number to call if they wanted to speak to their local police about policing, non-urgent crime and anti-social behaviour issues.

### Why is 101 being introduced?

The introduction of the 101 number will give local communities

one easy way to speak directly with their local police to report and discuss all non urgent police-related issues. It is being introduced as part of the Government's wider work to improve access to the police, ease pressure on 999 and help the police efficiently and effectively tackle crime and disorder. This new number will not change the way non-urgent calls are responded to. These will still be received by the call handlers in our police control rooms.

### How does 101 work?

101 will be available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. When someone calls 101, they will hear a recorded message announcing that they are being connected to their local police force. The system will determine the caller's location and connect them to the relevant police force. If a caller is on a boundary between two or more forces, the recorded message will give them a choice of which force to be connected to. The message will also give the caller the option to select an alternative police force if the incident they are calling about took place in another force area.

### When should callers use 101?

Callers should use 101 to report less urgent crime or disorder, to contact the police with a general enquiry, or to speak to a local officer. For example:

if their car has been stolen;

if their property has been damaged;

where they suspect drug use or dealing;

if they want to report a minor traffic collision;

if they want to give the police information about crime in their area;

or simply if they'd like to speak to a local police officer.

Can people who are deaf, hard of hearing or speech impaired, use 101? Yes by using text-phone 18001 101.

### From our local Councillor

I write as the holiday season draws to a close and having just returned refreshed from a week sunning myself with my family by the sea. We all need a break and I hope that many of those reading this article will have indulged themselves in a similar human battery charging exercise. Much happens in the County and our area during the summer months. I try and attend as many of the summer events as I can and meetings continue in Parish and County alike although the pace does slacken off a little in August.

I attended two particularly interesting meetings over the past month, both of which have particular relevance to all of us locally. The first was a meeting of the Melksham Area Board dedicated to older people and held during the afternoon so as to make it easier for older people to attend. We have already held two very successful younger people's Area Board meetings and so it was particularly rewarding to be the first Area Board in the County to hold one specifically for older people. It proved to be a great success and there was a wide ranging discussion on a range of topics specifically relevant to older people and often led by the indefatigable Brian Warwick who has become something of an older person's Champion in recent years. The real success of this meeting was that we were able to take away a good number of action points that would not otherwise have been considered and actually get things done for an important section of the community that wants them done.

The second important meeting I recently attended was a Conservative Party briefing on the Boundary Commission Review of Parliamentary Constituency Boundaries. This exercise will reduce the number of Parliamentary Constituencies by fifty and will give all Constituencies a similar number of voters. It is likely that Wiltshire and Dorset will have to lose a seat between them and that several current Constituencies will change. One of the parameters set by Parliament and the Boundary Commission is that local government Divisions and Wards may not be split between Constituencies. This will therefore mean that Summerham and Seend will be allocated to one Constituency instead of being split between the current three and the most likely result will be that we become part of the new West Wiltshire Constituency of Melksham, Trowbridge and Bradford on Avon. The Boundary Commission will announce their plans in mid September and appeals and submissions will follow with a final decision late 2012. Then the process of candidate selection and the work up to the next General Election will start in earnest.

Finally, as I write the car parking charges debate hots up. I have huge sympathy for town centre traders and motorists alike in this argument. Wiltshire is a County where there is a high car ownership rate in general and this is even higher in our rural Division of Summerham and Seend. However to make the first hour of parking free across the County would cost about £2million. Wiltshire Council has some hard decisions to make with a much reduced budget but those protesting about a 40p an hour parking charge must also consider which Sure Start Centre or which Bus Route or which Library or which Leisure Centre they would wish to see close instead, at a time when Wiltshire is virtually the only Council in the country that is closing none. I am afraid that making unpopular decisions sometimes goes with being the elected administration of a County but whatever happens these decisions must be taken responsibly and for the benefit of the whole community including the most vulnerable.

### VILLAGE HALL COMMITTEE

At the AGM Richard Clarke reported that the new stairlift had cost £1245 and had been supplied and fitted through a local firm in Warminster at a good discount. We are grateful for the donations from the Parish Council (£120), the Village Community Fund (£100), the Ladies Club (£120), and a gift of £40 from a villager. The balance was met by drawing on the accumulated funds which had been prudently built up under the management of David Harnott. We are grateful to Joe for the electrical work and making good the walls after the removal of the old lift.

Excluding the donations towards the cost of the stairlift the regular income covered the costs with nearly £300 to spare. However the net effect is that we start this year with £663 less in the bank than a year ago. However we still have £4300 put aside for a rainy day, but we do need to add to this each year to keep a prudent level of reserves for maintenance and improvements.

We are fortunate that we have four very active clubs supported by the villagers as they make a significant contribution to the income, especially the Bowls Club which pays £500 to hire the hall.

We are grateful to all the Villagers who support the 100 Club and also to Mike Truman who has taken over running it. Mike with his team of visitors has increased the participation for 2011 so the net income will rise to £935.
