#### Our sad goodbyes

In the last six months we have mourned the loss of good friends who have been part of our village life. Dorothy Young gave great encouragement to the Ladies Club during her time in the chair. For several years John Fennell made sure that the local footpaths remained not only in good condition but were improved, especially the stiles. And Kevin Crumpler's huge contribution was described by Russell in the tribute to his father at the Crematorium service.

"Throughout his life, Kevin was quite restless, and to be fair, at times impatient. He simply could not sit still and just do nothing. So whilst we are here today because his life was so tragically and unexpectedly cut short, I think I can confidently say that he fitted more into his life than a lot of people that make into their 80's and beyond. Looking back at Kevin's life it is very clear that whatever he did - whether organizing the village run, being Chairman of the Board of Governors at school, sailing on the Jolly Breeze, or raising his children, he never gave less than 100%.

Whether it was organizing many of the Agony Runs or Hangover parties, Chairing the Village Hall Committee, trying his best to help make a bonfire larger than the year before or somewhat ironically working to get a Defibrilator unit put up at the village hall, Great Hinton was always at the centre of Kevin's hectic life. Indeed, I know that any decision to potentially leave was horribly difficult and considered over a long period of time. It has been so lovely to hear comments such as Kevin was the glue that held the village together. That may have been true to a degree, but the reality is a village community can only be successful if enough people from that community step up and do their bit. I know that Kevin was very involved in a lot of village things, at times pushing people hard to attend events that they always ended up thoroughly enjoying. This means that his absence will leave something of a void. We hope you don't mind, but on behalf of Kevin and the rest of the Crumpler family, we implore everyone here to step up and do just a little bit more so that these wonderful events continue into the future. That will go a huge way to ensuring that Great Hinton's community spirit continues to thrive and that Kevin has a legacy of sorts.

Now of course, Great Hinton was also the village that Simon, Colin and Russell

grew up in and the one that they still in many ways view as home. To help with ensuring that the wonderful community spirit survives and thrives, we would like to work with whoever is prepared to help to bring back the Agony Run in 2015. We also suggest an Agony Walk to run alongside it, so that as many people can take part as possible, whether competitively or purely for fun. We can assure you that there will be a minimum of five Crumplers in the starting line up, no matter where in the world we are living at the time! We will also use the event to raise funds for the Wiltshire Air Ambulance and Great Hinton itself. Finally, we will donate a cup, perhaps to be called the KC Cup. This will ensure there is a prize for the fastest villager to finish the race. We then propose to entrust the KC Cup to the Village Hall Committee together with a request that they find a competition which will see it being awarded on an annual basis. That may be an Agony Run, it may be a best homemade beer competition or just the skittles award. Whatever it is, we hope that it helps keep the community spirit strong, as we know this is something Kevin would have desperately wanted."

And it was because of Kevin's foresight in earmarking the profits from the Agony Runs to the Hall rebuilding fund and then his involvement on the building committee that we now have a first class facility for our village clubs and activities to use.

#### Thank you

I would like to thank everyone who sent cards and messages to us after Kevin so unexpectedly and unfortunately passed away in April and thank you to those who came to his funeral. It was wonderful to see how much you all thought of him and how generous your donations were. The amount of money donated to the Wiltshire Air Ambulance was a fantastic £575. Thank you also for all the support you have given me since April. It is very much appreciated. Sandra

#### From our Local Councillor

August is a relatively quiet month in general Council terms but it can be busy in some areas of business and particularly in Libraries and Leisure services, both of which are part of my Cabinet portfolio. I therefore take the opportunity to get out and about and visit some of the 31 Libraries and 23 Leisure centres in Wiltshire. This is a great opportunity to talk to people as they use the facilities and to chat to staff about what is going well and perhaps not so well in their services. I always come back with a list which is not universally popular with senior managers but that is life and one of the purposes of my getting out on the ground is to see how things are and what we can do better. I always also come back with renewed and great admiration for our hardworking Council staff who really want to deliver the very best service that they can to the residents of Wiltshire and that is why being able to have a straightforward conversation with their Cabinet Member is so important.

Some issues are personal and some affect us all and one of the issues that affect us all is the use of RAF Keevil. Most of our local residents seem to be of the view that RAF Keevil belongs to the Ministry of Defence, has been here for a very long time and has been used for flying for a very long time - even at night and for low flying. However we always used to be informed of low and night flying matters until the MoD decided to reorganise its land and RAF management two years ago. In my opinion it would do no harm for the RAF and MoD to reconnect with their supportive local community around RAF Keevil and I have recently been in contact with the MoD and told them so. I am hoping that as a result of my representations Parishes will at least be informed when unusual activity that affects us all is planned. I am also in regular contact with the contractors for the proposed new runway at the airfield and they assure me that it is still being planned, that they have listened to local views expressed during the public consultation all those months ago and that they will be in touch when there is a firm date for taking the new runway proposal forward.

Summer is also a great time to catch up with locals at local events. I attend any local political events that I can and really enjoyed the Summerham Conservative lunch attended by 90 people in Keevil and at which I joined in a question and answer session with the local MP and a local Peer as well as having a jolly lunch and raising funds for the local Branch. Many people do not want to support political events and so I also make an effort to attend fetes and local events whenever I can and they are always a great opportunity to pick up news and views. Each event is different but they

all seem to get through the pocketful of change that I bring along to spend on the local produce and car boot type stalls, not forgetting other essentials like food, beer, cider and ice cream! Over the summer I also produce my annual summer In Touch leaflet letting people know what I have been doing as their local Councillor. I do this through a network of local helpers many of whom are not at all political but are happy to help deliver a few leaflets in their village for an hour a year. #### Dog Mess on the roads and paths

Unfortunately there are some dog owners and dog walkers who do not set out on their dog walk with a poo

bag so have no means to pick up their dog's mess. This has been a problem along Back Lane, so please be thoughtful and responsible and come with a plastic bag. Dog faeces left on the ground by irresponsible dog owners are not only unsightly and anti-social but also a potential health risk to young children.

Dog Control Orders are in place throughout Wiltshire and require the person in charge of a dog to clean up after it has defaecated on any area of land over which the public have right of way, including adjoining verges. If reported and found guilty of an offence, a person may incur a fixed penalty of £75. A complaint can be made to the Dog Warden on 0300 4560100.

#### Dog Mess in the fields

There is now a definite link confirmed between the parasitical diseases "Neosporosis" in cattle and "Sarcocystosis" in sheep caused by infected dog faeces. These illnesses can cause cattle to abort calves and mortality in sheep. Also there appears to be a link to Alabama Foot Rot disease in dogs which can cause paralysis and is usually fatal, especially in puppies. Latest official advice is for dog walkers to clear up after their dogs on grazing land and also to avoid feeding their pet raw meat, which is probably the original source of this illness. Even if the dog is

only fed on cooked food and appears to be perfectly healthy, it may well carry these diseases. Furthermore vets advise that injecting or worming your dog will not stop them passing on this parasite to cattle.

The Bonds, who farm a large amount of the grazing land around the village, have asked that all dog walkers clean up after their dogs because their herd has already been affected by this serious illness and have lost calves. Could all dog owners please adhere to this on the Bond's fields and also all other grazing land around our village (as well as our paths in the village).

The award will be presented at Mildenhall on 12 October when they receive their prize for best medium size

"The judging took place on a warm sunny day after rain overnight. There were leaves on the ground in all the villages from recent high winds which the judges ignored. The grass verges and residential gardens were outstanding and a joy to see with such colourful flowers. Many of the gardens had high banks, all kept immaculately. We were glad to see that the village hall has a defibrillator. This piece of equipment was purchased after a successful village appeal and villagers have been shown how to use it by a resident who is a doctor - such a good idea. The hall was neat and tidy and the war memorial plaque on it is where sevices are held on Armistice Day. The telephone kiosk was the most neat and tidy one we saw all day. It is brilliantly kept and the two village ladies who look after the books should be congratulated. It was a pleasure to see that the prize money from winning the Best Kept

Village Competition in 2012 had been used to purchase the nearby seat. The village pump, although no longer working, was in good condition. Most of the footpaths were in good order. However, the one in Back Lane is overgrown and needs attention. The Grapevine is produced in the village and is distributed to everyone. From the notes sent with the application to enter the competition it was apparent how much community spirit there is in the village. The map provided for the judges was a great help as it showed the whole of the village area including the listed buildings.
